Commissioner Willis called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Commissioner Willis expressed that emails were received from the following individuals that will be submitted into the record:

- Jennifer Gunter:
 - o Ms. Gunter submitted an emailed letter with the subject of election machines that was entered into the record.
- Christina Milcarek:
 - Ms. Milcarek submitted an emailed letter with the subject of election machines that was entered into the record.

Pamela Lyons-Nelson:

- Ms. Lyons Nelson expressed she was attacked by a dog that has resulted in surgery and the loss of the use of her right hand for two months;
- The dog has a history of attacking people:
 - o The dog has bitten six different individuals.
- The dog attacks unprovoked and gives no signs of an impending attack;
- The dog was returned to the breeder to avoid being put down;
- No one from dog control has contacted Ms. Lyons-Nelson;
- The dog is dangerous;
- The large dog is 27 inches in height; and
- A dog trainer stated that the dog's owner has done everything that could have been done to improve the animal's behavior:

o The dog is unable to be trained to stop biting.

Board discussion:

- The county is responsible for dog control;
- The board was unaware of the situation;
- Some individuals believe there should be a "no kill" policy regarding dogs:
 - o This is an example of why this is not a realistic policy.
- The board expressed they will investigate the incident; and
- Ms. Lyons-Nelson was escorted to Marion County Community Services (MCCS) for further discussion:
 - o MCCS oversees the county's dog control division.

PRESENTATION

1. Flu shot presentation - Rachel Posnick and Debbie Laughlin

Summary of presentation:

- Influenza is a respiratory virus spread from person-to-person through respiratory droplets;
- There are two types of influenza that effect humans, types A and B;
- Flu symptoms can include the following:
 - o Fever;
 - o Cough;
 - Sore throat;
 - o Runny nose;
 - o Congestion;
 - o Muscle and body aches;
 - o Headaches;
 - o Tiredness;
 - Vomiting; and
 - o Diarrhea.
- It takes two days to develop symptoms once a person has been exposed:
 - o A person is most infectious three to four days after symptoms start.
- People with a higher risk of severe illness include:
 - o Adults over the age of 65;
 - o Children under the age of five;
 - o Pregnant women; and
 - o Individuals with medical conditions including:
 - Asthma;
 - Diabetes; and
 - Heart disease.
- There are anti-viral medications to treat influenza;
- Influenza impacts three to eleven percent of the United States population:

- o In 2022, the flu affected 10,000 to 40,000 Marion County residents.
- The flu vaccine, as well as the following, are important tools in preventing influenza:
 - Avoid others who are ill;
 - o Cover the mouth when coughing or sneezing; and
 - O Wash your hands frequently with soap and water.
- The 2023 vaccine is based on flu activity occurring now in the southern hemisphere:
 - o The vaccine protects against four strains of influenza.
- It is recommended adults 65 years or older receive a higher dose vaccine;
- It is biologically impossible to obtain the flu from the flu vaccine;
- The vaccines prevention rate is 40 to 60 percent;
- Maximum effectiveness is reached 14 days after receiving the vaccine; and
- The flu vaccine can be administered at the following locations:
 - o A doctor's office;
 - o Marion County Health and Human Services; and
 - Most pharmacies.

- 3. Approve Amendment #8 to renew the Contract for Services with the Mid-Willamette Valley Community Action Agency, Inc. and add \$318,000 for a new contract total of \$1,852,559 to provide services to veterans in Marion County through June 30, 2024.

4. Approve a resolution authorizing Marion County Parks to apply for a County Opportunity Grant from the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department for planning at Salmon Falls Park.

Board discussion:

- Commissioner Bethell expressed the following:
 - o The Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission (OLCC) application was formerly under the business name of Remmy's Nightclub Restaurant and Sports Bard:
 - Denial was actively pursued for the Remmy's application, earlier in 2023 for repeated disturbance calls, and has been a burden on public safety resources due to bad behavior; and

- This is a new application, under a new name.
- The denial is supported because bad behavior should not be occurring in the community.
- Commissioner Cameron expressed the following:
 - The county has recommended denial of the OLCC application multiple times over the years:
 - The OLCC has denied the application.
 - The hope is that the OLCC will listen to the county's recommendation.

MOTION: Commissioner Bethell moved for approval of the consent agenda. Seconded by Commissioner Cameron; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

5. Consider approval of Amendment #1 to the Architecture and Engineering Standard Professional Services Agreement with Harper Houf Peterson Righellis, Inc. to add \$474,080.38 for a new contract total of \$634,120.38 to provide preliminary engineering for the McKay Road Traffic Safety Improvement project through December 31, 2026. –Ryan Crowther

Summary of presentation:

- The project is located on McKay Road:
 - o The project will focus on two different locations on McKay Road.
- The project scope for the intermittent safety improvements includes:
 - o Installing a center median with rumble strips;
 - Widening the roadway;
 - o Constructing associated drainage improvements; and
 - Other miscellaneous improvements as needed.
- An alternatives analysis has been completed:
 - O Space has been optimized to allow for as much median as possible without pushing out into the wetland area.
- The county's plan specifications and estimates are ready to move forward:
 - o This will allow for bid ready constructions documents.
- Amendment #1 will allow the county to move forward to where the project can be bid, and a contractor hired;
- Funding details for the project entail the following:
 - o The original contract amount is \$160,040;
 - o Amendment #1 adds \$474,080;
 - o The new contract total is \$634,120;
 - The project is 100 percent funded with federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars; and

- o The county has no funding match requirements for this phase of the project.
- The timeline for the project entails the following:
 - o The plans, specification, and estimate phase will be completed by the end of 2024;
 - o It is anticipated that construction will begin in 2025; and
 - o Project ends dates have been adjusted slightly further out in case more time is needed for project completion.
- This contract has the option to add construction services which include:
 - o Construction administration; and
 - O Assistance during construction from the engineer.

Board discussion:

- Concrete dividers were originally being considered for the project:
 - Concerns have been raised that emergency responders may have issues navigating emergency vehicles into an accident location if there are median barriers with limited road widths and guardrail constraints;
 - o Operations staff has expressed that 16 feet from the median barrier to the guardrail does not allow for routing traffic;
 - Concrete dividers are still an option for the future once an evaluation has been performed; and
 - The plans are to start the first phase of the project and consider the concrete dividers in a future project phase.
- The roadway has been built up with culverts below to allow for the flow of creek waterways;
- There are slopes that run down into the waterways;
- Widening the roadway and extending the guardrail out is expensive:
 - o There is no easy way to widen the roadway; and
 - o Impacted waterways can require special permitting.
- Most fatalities on this stretch of roadway have been head-on collisions;
- Commissioner Bethell requested more details at a later date for the following:
 - Access concerns that the fire district and emergency responders may have;
 - o The amount of the median that would be barriered;
 - Potential gap distance between barriers that could provide access for emergency responders; and
 - o High traffic corridor sections that are barriered where there may be an increase in accidents.
- Commissioner Bethell would like to bolster safety in the area;
- There is opportunity at this stage in the project to modify the plan to address safety concerns; and
- Commissioner Willis expressed the following:
 - The issue has been exacerbated because the Newberg and Dundee bypass was not completed;

- o There is traffic from individuals trying to avoid Yamhill County traffic;
- o Individuals are frustrated with high speeds;
- If the county is spending money on the project, then the problem needs to be solved; and
- While the county did not create the problem, we still need to be responsible for fixing the issue.

MOTION: Commissioner Cameron moved to approve Amendment #1 to the Architecture and Engineering Standard Professional Services Agreement with Harper Houf Peterson Righellis, Inc. to add \$474,080.38 for a new contract total of \$634,120.38 to provide preliminary engineering for the McKay Road Traffic Safety Improvement project through December 31, 2026. Seconded by Commissioner Bethell; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

6. Consider approval of Amendment #2 to the Architecture and Engineering Standard Professional Services Agreement with Dowl, LLC to add \$347,587.22 for a new contract total of \$1,021,036.91 to provide architecture and engineering services for the Rambler Drive NE: Little Pudding River Bridge Replacement project through October 31, 2025. –Ryan Crowther Summary of presentation:

- Amendment #2 to the contract will focus on the construction and oversight phase of the Rambler Drive NE project;
- The project is located northeast of the City of Salem;
- The existing bridge was built in 1963 and crosses over historic Lake LaBish:
 - o It is approximately 1575 feet in length;
 - o It is a timber structure; and
 - o It consists of two automobile lanes.
- The project scope entails the following:
 - o Replacement of a rotting timber deck;
 - o Repairing timber pile caps;
 - o Replacing compromised timber piles with steel piles;
 - o Replacing the existing bridge rail with a crash rated rail; and
 - o Constructing approach guardrails on each side.
- Dowl, LLC has been selected as the project consultant;
- Amendment #2 to the contract will provide for the following:
 - o Contract administration;
 - o Construction engineering; and
 - o Inspection services.
- The project scope for Amendment #2 will include:
 - o Project management;
 - o Construction quality assurance;

- o Submittal reviews;
- o Construction and environmental inspections;
- o Post construction bridge load rating; and
- o As-built drawings.
- It is anticipated that construction will begin in 2024;
- The current budget for the consultant contract is \$673,449.69:
 - o An estimated \$604,286.41 will be provided in federal funding; and
 - o The county will provide an estimated \$69,163.28.
- Amendment #2 adds \$347,587.22 in funding to the original contract:
 - o An estimated \$311,890.01 will be provided in federal funding; and
 - o The county will provide an estimated \$35,697.21 in funding.
- The new estimated contract total if Amendment #2 is approved will be \$1,021,036.91.

Board discussion:

- The contract provides for:
 - o Engineering;
 - o Construction oversight; and
 - o Project manager involvement.
- Engineering expenses can be approximately 25 percent of the contract budget:
 - o The project is approximately \$5 to \$6 million.
- Architecture and engineering consultants are selected based on qualifications:
 - Oregon Department of Transportation's (ODOT) standard billing rates are used for federal projects;
 - o ODOT negotiates with the consultants and the rates are competitive; and
 - O An escalated billing rate is negotiated based on overhead and profit margin:
 - Profit margins are typically around 10 percent;
 - They bill for staff hours;
 - Only the staff hours that are used are paid for; and
 - This contract has a not-to-exceed amount for time and materials.
- The federal funding that the county received is utilized specifically for bridges:
 - o An application was submitted through the local bridge program;
 - o Applications are submitted based on sufficiency ratings and other factors; and
 - o There are various categories for bridge funding.
- The bridge is 1,500 feet in length.

Motion: Commissioner Bethell move to approve Amendment #2 to the Architecture and Engineering Standard Professional Services Agreement with Dowl, LLC to add \$347,587.22 for a new contract total of \$1,021,036.91 to provide architecture and engineering services for the Rambler Drive NE: Little Pudding River Bridge Replacement project through October 31, 2025. Seconded by Commissioner Cameron; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

- A bridge located near the city of Scotts Mills is in the design phase;
- It is estimated that the project will start in 2026;
- A Marion County engineer is designing the bridge;
- The bridge is considered a historic structure:
 - o The county is working with the Oregon Historic Preservation Office.
- The right-a-way process will be starting soon.

7. Consider approval of the incoming funds Intergovernmental Agreement with the Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC) in the amount of \$27,236,824 for expenses related to community corrections supervision and services retroactive to July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2025. —Commander Mike Hartford

Summary of presentation:

- The Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) is with the Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC);
- The IGA provides community corrections funding for approximately 2,800 adults on parole, probation, or post-prison supervision within the county:
 - o The DOC administers the funding.
- Counties are required to submit a two-year plan to the state:
 - The plan provides an overview describing how the funding will be utilized;
 - o The funding formula is based on a daily rate, per client, that is on supervision; and
 - o Each county receives an allocation based on the number of clients on supervision.
- Marion County's allocation for the 2023 through 2025 biennium is approximately 10.8 percent of the state's approved budget:
 - O This is approximately \$27.2 million in grant and aid funding.
- The funding will be utilized for core services which includes:
 - o Supervision;
 - o Sanctions; and
 - o Services.
- The goal of the IGA and the county's state plan entails:
 - o Reducing criminal behavior;
 - Holding offenders accountable; and
 - O Assisting offenders to change.

Board discussion:

- Community corrections is important to public safety:
 - O There are many aspects to community corrections.

Reducing recidivism is important and changes lives.

MOTION: Commissioner Cameron moved to approve the incoming funds Intergovernmental Agreement with the Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC) in the amount of \$27,236,824 for expenses related to community corrections supervision and services retroactive to July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2025. Seconded by Commissioner Bethell; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

A. Public hearing to consider ten Ambulance Service Area (ASA) Franchise Applications. – Katrina Griffith and Matt Neuvenheim

Summary of presentation:

- The hearing is to consider ten Ambulance Service Area (ASA) Franchise Applications for Franchise Agreements;
- Each application term is for five years:
 - o The agreements currently expire on December 31, 2023.
- The ASA application process has been ongoing for several months:
 - The application process was streamlined by working with the ASA committee and provider partners;
 - o Applications were submitted; and
 - o The applications were reviewed with additional information being requested when needed
- All ten applicants are requesting reapproval:
 - The applicants have been providing services in Marion County for a long period of time:
 - o The applicants work well together; and
 - o They are familiar with each other's operations.
- County staff worked with the ASA committee and providers reviewing documents and bylaws to ensure everything is current; and
- The next step in the process will be consideration of the franchise agreements.

Testimony:

Kyle McMann, Marion County Fire Chief, Fire District #1:

- This has been a great process of collaboration for the last 15 years;
- The current process, which entails the following, has been positive:
 - o Having one point of contact;

- o The application process is more efficient and streamlined; and
- o Starting the process early provides stability for the citizens.

Board discussion:

- The commissioners expressed their appreciation to staff and the providers for the work they have done:
 - o The process has created some conflict in the past; but
 - o Conflict can be positive.
- Ms. Griffith listed the ten providers:
 - ASA #1 City of Salem Fire Department;
 - o ASA #2 Keizer Fire District;
 - o ASA #3 St. Paul Rural Fire Protection District;
 - o ASA #4 Marion County Fire District #1;
 - o ASA #5 Woodburn Ambulance Service;
 - o ASA #6 Lyons Rural Fire Protection District;
 - O ASA #7 Santiam Memorial Hospital Ambulance;
 - o ASA #8 Turner Rural Fire Protection District;
 - o ASA #9 Jefferson Rural Fire Protection District; and
 - ASA #10 Polk County Fire District #1:
 - Polk County provides service to a small area in South Salem.

Commissioner Willis closed the public hearing.
