INFORMATIONAL:

Review Award to Tyler Technologies for New Municipal Justice Software -Justin Kidd

Summary of presentation:

- The last few years there has been growth in the court;
- A big project currently happening is modernizing the court system;
- Currently a lot of time is spent duplicating work and not helping people;
 This is something that needs to be changed;
- Toby Giddings is helping, and five proposals have been reviewed;
 - There are two that really standout;
- Tyler Technologies was chosen in the end;
 - They are used throughout Oregon;
 - In a Justice Court, and various Circuit Courts;
 - They are aware of Oregon laws and procedures;
 - They have experience with the Justice Couty conversion;
 - They meet all the requirements;
- The downside is they are significantly more expensive than the others;
 - The cost per year, currently, is \$180,000;
 - There is an unneeded module, costing \$20,000, that can be removed;
- The current system is not sustainable;
- Magic is a homegrown computer-based system that does court records;
- Another system does the PDF's, which is not designed for courts;
 - When an action is done in one system is has to be found in the other and done there;
- Scheduling is currently done with an excel sheet;
- The other software looked into was Catalis;
 - The main selling point is its price;
 - It is not widely used in Oregon;
 - Only one tribal court uses it;
 - When legislature changes state law the user will need to ensure things change correctly;

- There is not experience with Justice Court conversions;
- They do not meet the encryption security requirement with IT;
- Civil cases are now done and the civil filing fees, to date, is \$57,000;
- Oregon State Police (OSP) cases attributed about half a million dollars, last year;
 This was about 4,400 cases;
- This year there has already been 4,000 OSP cases;
- There is a decrease in weighmaster tickets;
- The Sheriff's office is writing fewer tickets;
- The upfront cost for this software is \$331,000 which will come from American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA);
- The two systems currently used cost about \$25,000;
 - Magic and ORMS cost about \$25,000 a year;
 - Catalis is about \$61,000 a year;
- Staff spends majority of the time moving PDFs from one area to another;
 - The new software would allow staff to do customer service work instead;
- The goal is to make the court as efficient and friendly as possible;
- This system could also help smaller communities move public safety items through the system;
 - The current system does not allow this;
 - The new system would allow for this growth to happen;
- The ask is for \$950,000 for five years;

- Things are being done differently, for the right reasons, resulting in more revenue from the court cases;
- Create a spreadsheet with the current cost and cost of proposals;
- It is difficult to be the only county to use a specific software;
- It is better to have efficiency with technology and doing good work instead of more Full Time Equivalent (FTE); and
- The Board of Commissioners (BOC) is good to proceed.

Plan to Restart Jurisdictional Survey on Youth Tobacco and Substance Use

-Diana Dickey, Wendy Zieker, Conor Foley

Summary of presentation:

- This work started in 2019 to reach out to Marion County city councils through a survey on Youth Tobacco and Substance Use;
 - This was delayed because of the pandemic, and it was not completed;
 - The survey has been updated to include the following;
 - Concerns and knowledge about youth access to substance;
 - The risk and harm of substance use;
 - Policies and programs in place in communities to help with substance use;
 - Obstacles to and opportunities for addressing youth substance use;
 - Interest in learning about policy approaches to youth substance use;
- The survey will be sent to all Marion County city councils through email;
 - There will be follow-up in person presentations at city councils;
- This is the opportunity to assess local jurisdiction readiness in this area, give resources to communities and to create connections with leaders;
- There was discussion to expand and survey schools and, youth serving organizations; and

• Trying to get this started with city councils and then bring in these groups. **Board Direction:**

- The concern is everyone has an idea on what type of services to provide in their community;
 - Need to be specific on what Marion County offers;
 - If they would like something that is not offered, they are referred out to a place that does;
- It would be good to have partnership with community development; and
- The BOC is good to proceed.

Request for Approval to Purchase the Onboard Module for Neogov -Lori Klemsen

Summary of presentation:

- Human Resources (HR) is looking for way to be more efficient and hiring new employees;
- This module would streamline the recruitment to hire and entering employee information into Oracle process;
- Currently every new employee has to be manually entered into the system;
 - From Neogov into Oracle:
- Have met with IT to see if data feeding into Oracle could be done inhouse; •
 - IT determined that Neogov has the ability to do this;
 - It also comes with an employee portal allowing onboarding to happen right away;
 - It sends new employees' pre-employment paperwork;
 - This will help with engagement and retention;
- Currently it takes 20 minutes to enter one new employee:
 - This time could be used more efficiently;
- This module can also assist IT in creating logon and passwords for new employees; • more quickly;
- The request is for a two-year contract is \$38,739; •
 - There is a current Neogov contract that is over \$80,000;
 - This will be an ongoing cost every two years;
 - Neogov increases their technology costs by five percent every year;
- There is an HR module this is part of an enterprise management resource planning system;
 - Things will be looked at to see if it can be integrated;
 - Neogov should work well with this as it is a cloud based;
- There are better Oracle systems that can be investigated; and
- This can be on consent for Board Session.

2022-2023 Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER) -Steve Dickey

- Summary of presentation:
 - Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires participating jurisdictions to complete a CAPER at the end of each program year;
 - This closed June 30, 2023;
 - CAPER needs to be done within 45 days of the close;
 - CAPER provides a report status of the following; •
 - Projects funded through Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME programs;

- Public outreach efforts;
- Accomplishments through funding these projects;
- The CAPER includes activities associated with funding from program years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023;
- Some of the program highlights are;
 - Purchasing a facility to expand Soaring Heights Transitional Housing;
 - Supporting the Boys and Girls Club Epping Homestead operations;
 - Construction costs for the center for the Hope and Safety Hope Plaza;
- CAPER also shows how CDBG and HOME funds will be used in the upcoming year;
- This is the third year under HUD;
- This is the first year with significant reporting of fund accomplishments;
 - The first year the five-year consolidated plant was put together;
 - The second year some funding was spent, and the direction was formed;
- Marion County receives compensation of administrative costs for operating the program;
- This last year has brought contact with 39 different community partners through;
 - Public meetings;
 - Individual meetings;
 - Surveys;
- Soaring heights, Center for Hope and Safety and Valor Mentoring all received awards this year;
- A few other existing or potential partners are;
 - Dev Northwest;
 - Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments;
 - Sheltering Silverton;
 - Home Ownership Polit Project Program;
- Other highlights include;
 - The homeowner rehabilitation program cap was increased;
 - From \$15,000 to \$50,000;
 - This is an up to amount;
 - The down payment assistance program cap was increased;
 - From \$25,000 to \$125,000;
 - This is an up to amount;
 - Still waiting for HUD to approve the changes;
- A large portion of the work is continuing building programs for them to work and connecting resources to the needs in the community; and
- This will be brought to board session on September 13, 2023.

• The BOC is good to proceed;

Dolly Parton Imagination Library – Emergent Economic Opportunity Program (EEOP) Application

Summary of presentation:

- On August 24, 2023, representatives from the Dolly Parton Imagination Library presented the program to the BOC;
- This program will most likely be funded through the EEOP;
- This would be for all of Marion County except for zip code 97302;
 - \circ $\;$ The rotary will try to get it done in that area; and
- This will be for \$30,000 for three years.

- The BOC is good to proceed with this as long as the representatives present this at board session, so the public is aware;
- Commissioner Colm will visit the rotary to see what they are able to do;
 They have funded 97306 and were looking into funding 97302;
- Commissioner Colm to contact Representative Kevin Mannix;
 - As East Salem Rotary covers a portion of 97302; and
- After the EEOP application is submitted, they will come back to the BOC.

Request Approval for Renewal Purchase of Annual Digital Asset Protection License

-Gary Christofferson, Steve Brooks

Summary of presentation:

- This is renewal of software that was originally purchased two years ago;
- This is for the annual software and maintenance support for the county's security information management solution named Siem;
- The software has the following features;
 - Automatically detects suspicious items;
 - Allows staff to troubleshoot network server issues;
 - Has built in threat detection capabilities;
 - Detects malicious activity;
- Annual maintenance is needed so the software is;
 - Up to date;
 - Free of bugs;
 - Free of security flaws;
 - Runs optimally;
 - The maintenance fees pay for;
 - Ongoing product development;
 - Ongoing product updates and enhancements;
 - Security updates;
 - Technical assistance and support resources;
 - Technical support that is 24/7;
- The county has different software collecting logs and this software would put them all in one place;
 - This would allow for one piece of software to be looked into to find malicious activity;
- This would also help with event correlation; and
 - It would allow event to be researched and assess if the data is meaningful;
- This will come to board session September 6, 2023; and
- This can come on consent.

Legislative Update:

-Alvin Klausen

Summary of presentation:

- Letter from the Aurora Rural Fire District;
 - Requesting funding to finish construction;
 - Commissioner Cameron asked to bring this to Management Update;
 - They have a shortfall of \$3 million for the infrastructure of the facility;

- Salem City Council Vote;
 - This was for the repeal of the payroll tax;
 - The vote was 6-3 and the tax will be going to the voters;
 - Meeting with Public Works and US Department of Transportation;
 - Bridge improvement grant update;
 - Was not granted this year and will apply next year;
 - There were 260 applications received;
 - The county's application was recommended but not selected;
 - The request was rated medium/high on return on investment;
 - The request was rated medium for readiness;
 - The application for next year will be release at the end of this year;
- Representative Rick Lewis would like to meet with the BOC and Scotts Mills leaders;
 - This is regarding the Scotts Mills dam removal issue;
 - The meeting would be Tuesday September 5, 2023 from 1pm to 3pm;
- Commissioner Willis met with Branden Pursinger;
 - The Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) was discussed;

- Letter from the Aurora Rural Fire District;
 - There is ARPA funding at the state level that can be acquired through state senators and representatives;
 - Do not want to fund fire districts through county dollars
 - Alvin Klausen to write a letter of support to ask for this from the state;
 - Representative Lori Chavez-DeRemer's office to be sent this letter;
- Representative Rick Lewis Meeting;
 - Marion County staff should not be used to get to the BOC;
 - This will not move forward until there is a discussion with legal and the BOC;
- Branden Pursinger and HCP;
 - The chair recommends a change to the HCP of five to 10 million board feet;
 - \circ Testimony on September 7, 2023, and Commissioner Cameron signed up;
 - Testimonies will line up with Brandon and Commissioner David Yamamoto of Tillamook County;
 - Maybe lawsuit can be done through federal court;
 - The rural communities need to be educated on this issue;
 - Through a Marion County Today publication;
 - The governor wants 35,000 housing units and Board of Forestry wants to cut back 40 percent of the timber used in Oregon, that can't be exported;
 - A graphic showing what affordable housing looks like with Oregon timber and exported timber;
 - There is a vast amount of information that needs to be put together;
 - Oregon forest Resources Institute (OFRI);
 - Alvin Klausen to reach out to Commissioner David Yamamoto;
 - His office can provide the information needed;
 - Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the director of Department of the Interior is trying write a rule stating that conversation is a use;
 - The River Democracy Act trying to be brought through by Senator Ron Wyden;
 - The uses might be overlapped so there will not be such a large impact;
- Kirby is coming October 5, 2023;

- Will work on realigning federal priorities;
- The bridge improvement grant;

Summary of presentation:

- Marion County Today;
 - Need edits from two commissioners;

COMMISSIONERS' COMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS and UPDATE

Commissioner Danielle Bethell

- Spoke with Representative Rob Nosse regarding aid and assist;
 - Many are trying to fix the issue causing chaos;
 - Representative Ed Diehl is creating relationships;
 - Asked public safety to put together a visual;
 - Representatives Diehl, Mannix, Cramer to meet with the Sheriff's office and Health and Human Services;
 - Commissioner Cameron will attend;
 - So, county staff is not given direction from a representative;
 - Rep. Nosse asked for MC staff to put together high-level information;
 - Find laws and rules creating barriers to the suggestions given;
 - Present this to Rep. Nosse and he will take it to the short session;
 - Will agree if Cherryl Ramirez agrees;
 - Need to meet with Ebony Clarke and the director of the state hospital;
 Rep. Nosse needs to hear their concerns;
 - This needs to be presented the first week of November and Rep. Nosse will decide if this goes to short session;
- Spoke to Judge Audrey Broyles;
 - Judge Broyles will take the courts perspective regarding aid and assist;
 - This will be discussed by her with all the judges;
 - Judge Broyles will inform the BOC what the courts would like to have pursued on their behalf;
- Will meet with the District Attorney, Health and Human Services, Law Enforcement regarding aid and assist;

- The legislation for the aid and assist issue will be drafted by Marion County in partnership with Rep. Diehl and Rep. Mannix; and
 - Rep Nosse (chair of the behavioral health committee in the House) asked for this to go through Rep. Diehl and Rep. Mannix.

- Alvin Klausen to follow up with Shawnnell to make sure that meeting next week is taking placed; and
 - Also reach out to Senator Kim Thatcher regarding the work happening.

Commissioner Kevin Cameron

- Association of Oregon and California Counties meeting;
 - Decided to move forward to the US Supreme Court on the lawsuit;
 - The US president has the authority to override congress regarding the monument issue;
- Attended Salem Keizer Area Transportation Study (SKATS);
 - Cherriots and Salem want to bring a facilitator to look at the governance process of SKATS as Aumsville comes in;
 - Unsure if bringing a facilitator will happen;
 - Same structure should be kept and have Aumsville come in per BOC;
 - Carl Lund attended the meeting;
 - Will talk to legal counsel regarding where the burden falls in case of no majority vote to add Aumsville on its own;
 - There are only two cases where a majority vote is needed;
 - Projects do not want to be unanimous; and
 - The governor needs to approve changes in governance structure.

Board Direction:

- Scott Norris will look at the bylaws; and
 - \circ Chad Ball will send the bylaws he has.

Commissioner Colm Willis

- Attended the Health Department picnic;
 - It was a great event with many attendees.

<u>OTHER</u>

Commissioner Bethell – message regarding Taylor's House Funding;

- Jimmy Jones stated he is paying for Taylor's house through the Department of Human Services (DHS) and a document recording fee;
 - The state is projecting much less in the document recording fee because of interest rates;
 - Stated ARPA funding can be used to fund this;
- Taylor's House has mostly DHS foster kids and some beds for kids on the streets;
- There is no ARPA funding as it has all been set aside for other items;
- CDBG funding may help but they may not serve kids outside of Salem; and
- There are other funding sources if this is a priority for the BOC.

Board Direction:

• The BOC will not do anything at this time as DHS might see funding coming from elsewhere and they may pull back.

Jessica Stanton – Public Safety Coordinating Council;

• New appointments coming to management update and board session.

- No need to come to management update to present who is being appointed;
- If appointees can come they can share why they are on the council if not this can go to consent at board session;
 - Julie Hoy might like to attend;
 - She can be on the executive committee; and
 - She will be the city council liaison.

Commissioner Bethell – New Health Building and Old Juvenile Tour;

- The new health building is beautiful;
 - The direction signs are in brass which is very difficult to see;
- Need to make a decision on what to do with the old juvenile building;
 - There are office chairs, filing cabinets and binders in good condition to be used;
 - Some items can be used in the new health building;
 - Some items no longer have any use;
 - There will be a nonprofit access day where nonprofits can come in and take what they need;

Board Direction:

• The new health building will have a ribbon cutting in the beginning of November;

Commissioner Bethell – Northwest Human Services;

- There is a need for behavioral health providers in the community;
- Conversations with partners in the community need to be had;
- There is a gap in the system and Marion County can be the facilitator;
- A transparent system of care is needed showing where individuals get help so double work is not done; and
 - Individuals are going from place to place getting care and this is costly;
- The environmental scan that was discussed last week can help with the challenges;
- The facility has care that covers many aspects when one place;
- There are unsheltered individuals passing away and this needs to be prevented;
- Arches is the only facility in Salem that has harm reductions measures;
 A box is provided to help with taking drugs safely; and
- The public is not aware of what is happening regarding community organizations and the drug help that is being given.

Board Direction:

- Josh Lair has a list of facilities of where he takes homeless clients and what barrier each facility has;
- Many individuals are passing away because they are overdosing, and Measure 110 made this more possible;
- Many community organizations were excited with the funding that would come from Measure 110;
 - There is the belief that police resources should not be used on providing treatment for unsheltered drug users;
- Measure 110 needs to be on the ballot which is \$222,000 for Salem;
 - This will be a few million dollars;
- Marion County may be able to pay to collect signatures and get it on the ballot;
- A conversation can happen with counties to form a collation to collect money for someone to do the work; and
 - Alvin Klausen to work on this.
