INTRODUCTION

It is with great pleasure that I present the Recommended FY 2016-2017 budget. This budget reflects Marion County's upward economic growth and rebounding property values that mean additional revenues to serve our growing communities. Marion County is comprised of approximately 2,500 farms; encompasses 285,000 acres of land; produces more than 70 different commodities; grows many crops that are number one, two, or in the top five in the nations, such as nursery crops and Christmas trees, and has the highest or near the highest value of agricultural production of any county in Oregon.

The Marion County Extension and 4-H Service District (Service District) identified funding priorities for this budget during its May 3, 2016 district meeting. Those priorities included:

- a. Stabilizing funding for contracted positions
- b. Establishing reserve funding for future capital and operational priorities
- c. Addressing the Service District's ability to provide education and services to the public.

Though the budget marks the second operational year of the Service District, the Marion County Board of Commissioners has supported OSU Extension and 4-H programs through financial and in-kind supports for many years; however the Recommended Budget does not require county contributions to balance the budget.

As in the first year budget of the Service District, I am not recommending any change to levy rate of \$0.05 per \$1,000 assessed value; this is the maximum allowed. The proposed FY 2016-2017 budget is \$1,624,002, which represents more than a \$225,000 increase over the FY 2015-2016 adopted budget of \$1,398,341; equaling 16% growth. The budget increase is attributed to carryover from the prior fiscal year, and to a lesser extent, rising ad valorem revenues.

The budget reflects an estimated increase in taxable values of approximately 3%, or \$32,000 over the current year, as well as no revenues from Marion County.

GROWTH IN REVENUE

At \$1.09 million, the FY16-17 (Current and Previous Years) taxes constitute more than two thirds of the overall budget; Net Working Capital represents \$528 thousand or 32% of the total revenue - largely from unused Marion County contributions from FY 15-16; and a very small percentage derived from Interest earnings, \$2,500.

Overall, the Service District budget reflects a 16% growth in revenue, despite no revenues anticipated from Marion County in the coming year.



RECOMMENDED FUNDING

Within the second year of operation, the Service District is responding to community priorities represented in the 2014 feasibility study. In addition to supporting OSU Extension Contracted Services, the proposed Requirements support the Board's funding priorities, as well as other financial obligations. The largest investments are OSU Contracted Services to the tune of \$965 thousand, Capital Reserves \$348 thousand, and Contingency \$156 thousand – equaling 90% of the overall budget. Additionally, nearly \$57 thousand supports services provided by Marion County departments. Though the cost for these

county-delivered services represents 4% of the total Requirements, the amount is based on a 5% calculation of the district's imposed levy projection amount received from the Marion County Assessor's Office (\$1,138,603.77).

FUNDING PRIORITIES FOR FY2016-2017

On June 10, 2015, the Marion Board of Commissioners declared the formation of the Marion County Extension and 4-H Service District. On that same day, the district's governing body met and adopted Resolution 15R-48 that

imposed ad valorem property taxes upon the assessed value of all taxable property and categorizing those taxes for purposes of Article XI, section 11b of the Oregon Constitution, per ORS 310.060. This budget assumes the same imposed ad valorem property taxes for FY 16-17.

Services to the Community

The Board has given direction to continue funding direct services delivered to communities across the county, including the development of educational materials. The district proposed budget supports the continued roll out of services anticipated in the 2014 Marion County Extension and 4-H Service District Feasibility Statement under the following categories: 4-H Youth and Families; Community Horticulture and Natural Resources; Farms and Forestry Business; Small Farms and Community Food Systems; Marketing and Administrative Program Support. Additionally, the Groundwater Education Program position that began in FY15-16 is budgeted to continue within the proposed budget, as well as \$15,000 identified for the development of educational materials.

Over the past year, Oregon State University has worked directly with the Marion County OSU Extension staff in the development of position requirements, recruitment, and the hiring of qualified faculty and staff members to serve Marion County's families, farms and food systems' needs. The proposed budget reflects a 23% FTE increase over last fiscal year's total of 8.2 FTE secured. Of the total FTE budgeted, approximately 2.15 FTE are yet to be hired, but are anticipated to be filled within the coming fiscal year.

I am recommending an increase to the OSU Extension Contracted Services budget to accommodate pay increases for district-supported faculty and staff positions. The Service District does not have any of its own paid staff members; all FTE represented in this budget message reflects contracted services through OSU Extension Services.

Future Sustainability

Marion County's economic growth forecast looks promising, yet due to the not too distant recession and the newness of the Service District, the budget presented today represents a conservative revenue forecast and set-aside reserves for future capital and operational needs.

The conservative revenue approach anticipates 3.5% growth for the taxes collected and an anticipated Net Working Capital from unspent funds from the prior year: Marion County contributions and underspent contractual obligations. Since the district has yet to close out its first year of operational expenses, there are variables that make it difficult and risky to make assumptions without past trends or experience.

The Unappropriated Capital Reserve is the entire amount received from Marion County in FY15-16 and will serve as the launch pad for the district to begin investing in its future. There is a modest contingency set aside for operational needs, \$156,215. In forecasting out this level of funding with the 3.5% growth of taxes collected through FY21-22 and 3% growth in OSU Extension contracted services, it appears to allow for sustainability of the various programs and services being implemented, as well as the continued investment into the district's Capital Reserves – most of the reduction being absorbed by the district's operational Contingency.

Community Education

During FY15-16, the Service District's board expressed interest in strengthening community education efforts to the general public about services deemed important. The proposed budget includes a modest budget of \$15,000 to produce relevant materials through the OSU contract. Additionally, of the 10.05 FTE that are funded, 6.75 FTE provide hands-on services to the communities across the county. These faculty and staff members will continue to work with growers, business people, foresters, youth and community leaders to understand their needs, issues and couple each situation and need with research to ensure the district's funds are being spent wisely as well as providing appropriate services to the public.

Additional Considerations

In addition to the Board's funding priorities, this budget also has other on-going priorities that allow the district to continue its rolling out of services to the community.

I am recommending that the Service District continue its support of agricultural development opportunities for young people in our county. The budget reflects \$11,000 to support youth who participate at the Marion County Fair through 4-H and Future Farmers of America programs.

The FY16-17 budget does not include any County General Fund Support. The county's budget did not include funds for the district in its upcoming budget; however, the county will continue to provide various contracted services to ensure the district is properly managed and supported: legal and financial services, contract management, administrative supports, and others services as needed and appropriate. Though this is a recommendation for the current year, it does not preclude the district to explore future county funding interests.

Capital Reserves

Though the district does not have a solidified plan for future office needs or other capital expenditures, as the district continues to grow and secure services provided by OSU Extension, office space will need to be reviewed in the future. The current office location accommodates the current needs of the faculty and staff members, as well as provides space for community education opportunities; however I am aware that this may be a concern as the program expands. Currently the district is under a lease agreement for its OSU Extension office space and community education needs. Last fiscal year, additional space was added to the lease agreement to accommodate the new hires through OSU Extension Services, which is reflected in the Recommended Budget.

The Unappropriated Capital Reserve recommended in the budget is \$348,828 and will allow the district to begin preparing for its future, be in a better position to take advantage of future partnerships that might arise, and be prepared for major repairs and replacements. Demands will be strong over the next several years to place funding into new and exciting projects; nevertheless, replenishment of the reserve should be a priority as well.

The budget reveals a 21% Capital Reserve set-aside of the total operating expenditures.

Contingency

Due to the district being in its initial stages of development, the budget provides stability through a proposed Contingency of a little more than \$156,000 – a total of 10% of the total operating expenditures. As your budget officer, I believe it's important to place a priority on prudent use of available resources. As the district rolls out the services envisioned in the original feasibility study, the demands from the communities it serves are still being actualized. The growing demands that the communities place on the district must be balanced with the financially prudent practice of contingency. These funds will afford us an opportunity to play a key role in developing our future while establishing financial health.

CONCLUSION

The FY16-17 Recommended Budget addresses the Service District's top priorities. It emphasizes the district's existing and on-going development of services to the residents of the county, as well as planning for growth infrastructure needs for the future.

I am optimistic that the economy will maintain a steady growth pattern, yet I am recommending a conservative approach until the district is more established and becomes clearer about the core services in demand by the public it serves. In the coming years we must balance growth with needed infrastructure for the future. In addition, we must be alert to new opportunities and retaining talent secured through our OSU Extension Services contract.

The Marion County Extension and 4-H Service District was established at a financially good time that will provide the district the opportunity to develop strong roots and supports needed for when the economy slumps. As we continue to develop and expand our services, we must invest in our existing assets, our capacity to capitalize on opportunities, and our ability to serve Marion County.
