

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Acronym/Term	Description
ABH	Adult Behavioral Health, an office within the Marion County Health Department that provides services to adults 18 years and older suffering from persistent and severe mental illness.
ACE	Adverse Childhood Experiences
AMH	Addictions and Mental Health Division, the division of the Department of Human Services that is responsible for delivering adult and children’s mental health and addiction services. Mental health services are delivered locally through community mental health departments and organizations, as well as through state-operated psychiatric hospitals in Salem, Portland and Pendleton. The division is also responsible for delivering addiction prevention and treatment services in the areas of alcohol, tobacco, other drugs and problem gambling.
CA	Crisis Associate
Capitation	The payment model based upon prospective payment for services, irrespective of the actual amount of services provided, generally calculated on a per Oregon Health Plan Member per month basis.
CAPS	Community and Provider Services, the Marion County office that manages the IDS system and indigent alcohol and drug dollars for Marion County.
CASII	Child and Adolescent Severity Intensity Instrument, an assessment tool to determine need of service for a child or adolescent (6 – 18 years of age), developed by the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.
CBH	Child Behavioral Health, an office within the Marion County Health Department that provides a full range of out-patient mental health services available to Medicaid eligible clients ages 0-18 and their families.
CCC	Child Care Coordinator, the CAPS position responsible for connecting children/adolescents to outpatient treatment with an IDS Provider. For more information, please see section II(6).
CCP	Consumer Care Partnerships, an organization designed to provide peer-based outreach and support for people struggling with mainstream treatment modalities, recurrent crises and social isolation.
CMHP	Community Mental Health Program
COD	Co-Occurring Disorder
CPMS	Client Process Monitoring System, the State of Oregon processing system that tracks community-based treatment services for persons with mental illness, persons with developmental disabilities, and persons with substance abuse problems. For more information, please see section II(21).
DHS	Department of Human Services, the State of Oregon department comprised of five divisions: Children, Adults and Families Division, Addictions and Mental Health Division, Public Health Division, Division of Medical Assistance Programs, and Seniors and People with Disabilities Division.
DMAP	Division of Medical Assistance Program, the division of the Department of Human Services that oversees the Oregon Health Plan. The division also includes provisions for oversight, research and analysis to achieve the best use of health-care funding

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EAST	Early Assessment and Support Team, an organization that works to identify young people who are experiencing psychosis and to provide the information and support they need to continue on their life path. For more information, please see section III(14).
Emergent	An appointment requested in response to a member's need for service that must be scheduled within 24 hours in order to assure the member's safety. Emergent appointments primarily occur at the Psychiatric Crisis Center, but may also occur at any of the IDS agencies. For more information, please see section II(2).
Encounter	A process of recording services provided to OHP members.
FFS	Fee-For-Service, the payment for reimbursable services retrospectively based upon agreed rates and the amount of service provided.
HIPAA	Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, the Federal regulations establishing national standards for health care information.
HRSA	Health Resources and Services Administration, an agency of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, is the primary Federal agency for improving access to health care services for people who are uninsured, isolated or medically vulnerable.
IDS	A system of care that is developed in Marion County to provide outpatient mental health services to Oregon Health Plan members through contracts with local providers.
IDS Provider	Integrated Delivery System Provider, any agency who is contracted with Community and Provider Services to provide mental health services to Oregon Health Plan members.
LMHA	Local Mental Health Authority, the county court or board of commissioners of one or more counties who choose to operate a CMHP; or, if the county declines to operate or contract for all or part of a CMHP, the board of directors of a public or private corporation which contracts with DHS to operate a CMHP for that county, as defined in ORS 430.620.
LMP	Licensed Medical Practitioner
Managed Care	A term used to describe the process of managing treatment dollars.
MCHD	Marion County Health Department
MCO	Managed Care Organization
Medicaid	Federal and state funded portion of the Medical Assistance Program established by Title XIX of the Social Security Act, as amended and administered in Oregon by the Department of Human Services.
Member	A client who is eligible for Oregon Health Plan who may or may not be receiving mental health services.
MH	Mental Health
MHO	Mental Health Organization, a Prepaid Health Plan under contract with the Department of Human Services to provide Covered Services under the Oregon Health Plan Medicaid Demonstration Project and State Children's Health Insurance Program.
MMIS	Medicaid Management Information System, an online database that provides up-to-date Oregon Health Plan eligibility information.

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MVBCN	Mid-Valley Behavioral Care Network, a managed behavioral healthcare organization directed by a partnership of consumer-advocates and service providers who offer a continuum of mental health and chemical dependency services in Linn, Marion, Polk, Tillamook, and Yamhill Counties.
MVIPA	Mid-Valley Independent Physician's Association, an association that contracts with more than 10 insurance carriers, including commercial, Medicare, Oregon Health Plan, and workers' compensation, representing more than 120,000 covered lives.
OAR	Oregon Administrative Rules
OFSN	Oregon Family Support Network, an organization developed to provide support to families by families who have children and adolescents with mental, emotional, and/or behavioral disorders.
OHP	Oregon Health Plan, the State of Oregon's health care reform effort consisting of a Medicaid Demonstration Project, State Children's Health Insurance Program, an individual insurance program for persons excluded from health insurance coverage due to pre-existing health conditions, and a group insurance program for small businesses.
OHP Member	A client who is eligible for Oregon Health Plan who may or may not be receiving mental health services.
PCC	Psychiatric Crisis Center, a center that provides crisis intervention services seven days a week, twenty four hours a day for residents of the Mid-Willamette Valley, particularly Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties.
PCP	Primary Care Physician
PhTech	Performan Health Technology, the current third party administrator
PMHNP	Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner
QMHA	Qualified Mental Health Associate
QMHP	Qualified Mental Health Professional
Routine	An appointment requested in response to a member's need for service that can safely (with no risk to the member) be scheduled within 14 days of the member's initial contact. For more information, please see section II(2).
State	State of Oregon
STAY	Safe Treatment Alternatives for Youth, a program designed to treat youth ages five to seventeen who are experiencing acute psychiatric crisis. For more information, please see section III(12).
TOTAL	Transitional Options and Treatment Alternatives, a crisis respite program available through Northwest Human Services. For more information, please see section III(13).
TPA	Third Party Administrator, the organization that processes claims for the Mid-Valley Independent Physician's Association and this is currently Performance Health Technology.
TSP	Trauma Survivor Project, a program designed to assist the Mid-Valley Behavioral Care Network providers in the development and implementation of chemical dependency, mental health and peer delivered services that are respectful, sensitive and responsive to the needs of male and female survivors of severe psychological trauma that is often related to severe sexual abuse, physical abuse and/or emotional abuse or neglect.
