## GENERAL RULES - F.F.A. SHOW

1. All animals shall be housed in the livestock buildings.
2. Any active FFA member in good standing may exhibit.
3. All animals exhibited have been owned by and cared for by the exhibitor not less than 60 days prior to entry. Exhibitors may be called to produce proof of ownership; breed classification will be determined by the division superintendent.
4. No animals may be entered in more than one class, except pens or special breed classes.
5. A member may receive premium on a maximum of two animal entries per class.
6. Each exhibitor is responsible for his own animals' feeding, watering and other care. Bring your own feed, bedding, and water containers. Sawdust only allowed for bedding. Dairy Exhibitor ONLY are allowed to use straw bedding
7. All exhibits must be entered by 8 pm Wednesday and cannot be removed prior to 6 pm on Sunday.
8. All animals will receive a clinical inspection upon arrival.
9. All animals entered will be available for use in the judging contest.
10. Individual premiums, provided by Marion County Fair, will be paid only for entries listed in this book. Payment will be mailed to the local chapters.
11. An individual must enter one class of showmanship if showing large and small animals. If showing just small animals, (example: poultry and rabbits) member must show in both classes of showmanship. Must use an animal owned by individual, which must have been shown in a confirmation or market class.
12. All market lambs will be shorn after July 2, 2009, if they are to weigh for the livestock sale.
13. Champion and Reserve Rosettes will be presented at discretion of the judge.
14. Market animals may be weighed only once.
15. First, Second and Third place banners will be awarded in Herdsmanship.
16. Points will be awarded and converted into money after all other fair bills and expenses have been paid.
17. All Nursery and Ornamental Horticulture entries must be identified by class prior to entry. One entry per class per individual or chapter. All class project entries must be identified with the name of the individual who performed the skill or technique.
18. At judge's discretion, first place award may not be given.
19. Register immediately following unloading.
20. Official FFA Dress for the County Fair will be:
  - I. Conformation Classes
    - a. White shirt, FFA tie, black trousers
    - b. FFA Jackets if weather permits
  - II. Showmanship Livestock (Beef, Sheep, Swine)
    - a. White shirt, FFA tie, black trousers
    - b. FFA jacket
    - c. White trousers, Dairy
21. A Grand Champion Showmanship trophy winner is ineligible for that award in subsequent years. He may compete for premiums where offered and is also eligible for awards in other divisions. If he is champion showmanship in the class the next year, the Reserve Champion shall lead out to compete for the trophy.
22. All animals to be exhibited in market classes must be weighed at regular weigh-ins.
23. Superintendents and/or chapter advisors will withhold premiums for infractions of the general rules.
24. Premiums will be withheld from any Livestock Exhibitor who fails to show his own livestock in the Showmanship Class.
25. Market steers must be dehorned.
26. All manure & bedding to be removed from barn by 8am
27. All livestock exhibits must be clean and manageable.
28. All Tack Pens, including grooming chutes, sheep trim stands, etc., must be marked by Chapter Name.
29. If any animal or poultry is removed for any reason, the FFA superintendent must be informed and an *Animal Release Form* must be completely filled out and on file at the Livestock Office before removing the animal or poultry from the fairgrounds.
30. Any question of judgment or interpretation of the rules not specifically covered by the above rules shall be governed by the FFA Superintendents. Their decisions shall be final.
31. If for ANY reason your animal or poultry needs medical treatment, a *Medical Treatment Form* must be completely filled out and on file at the Livestock Office.
32. Pens must be cleaned out at time of animal release.

## HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

### Very Important

1. A clinical inspection will be made for all animals and poultry showing clinical evidence of disease may be refused entry. Diseased animals must be removed from the fairgrounds.
2. Animals and poultry affected with warts, ringworm or other skin conditions or unsightly blemishes will be refused entry into the fairgrounds or removed from the fairgrounds at the discretion of the veterinarian or his representative.
3. Animals and poultry which develop a disease condition during the course of the fair are to be removed from the premises and returned to the farm of origin or otherwise dispose of.

4. By entering your animal in the fair, you are giving consent to the barn superintendent and the Fair board to contact a veterinarian for emergency services. The owner will be responsible for any fees sustained in the effort to diagnose or treat an animal.

## SECTION 1 - SHOWMANSHIP

The Champion Showman of each species will then compete for Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Showmanship Award. Animals used in the Round Robin Livestock Showmanship Contest must have previously been shown in a Showmanship class and be of the same age group whenever possible.

Members exhibiting livestock are required to make entry for the showmanship award in at least one division their livestock is entered. Members who exhibit livestock and poultry/rabbits are required to show in a showmanship class for both areas. A showmanship entry may be made for each kind of livestock entered. Animals to be shown in the showmanship class must have been shown in a conformation class at which time the Superintendent or the Judge may eliminate a showmanship entry from showmanship competition.

Showmanship class is divided into Novice and Advanced Showmen. Novice Showmen include exhibitors with no experience (including 4-H, Open Class) exhibiting that species prior to Jan. 1, 2009. Advanced Showmen include exhibitors who have had experience (including 4-H, Open Class) exhibiting with that specific species, prior to Jan. 1, 2009.

If entries total more than 15 in each Division, superintendents will split entries into two or more classes.

The first and second place winners in each showmanship class will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion Showmen for each species. Each participant for the FFA Grand Champion Showmanship Award will show six animals in addition to their own. These animals will be selected by the superintendent of the beef, dairy, dairy goat, meat goat, sheep and swine sections. Following this, each will show their own animal. Each contestant will draw for the animal they will show upon entering the show ring.

\*\*Each contestant will be ranked on a 2 to 5 point basis by each judge for each species. Individual with the fewest points will be the winner.

### FFA LIVESTOCK SHOWMANSHIP Scoring Factors

1. Appearance of showman (neat, clean, properly dressed)

## SECTION 2 - HERDSMANSHIP

The herdsmanship award is made on both individual and chapter basis. All FFA livestock exhibitors must make a herdsmanship entry for each kind of livestock entered. If animal(s) or exhibitor's area is not properly cared for on a daily basis, the Herdsmanship Judge, Dept. Supt., and Ag Advisor have authority to withhold premium money and have exhibitor take animal from fairgrounds. To be considered for the herdsmanship award, the exhibitor must have exhibitor card neatly completed and displayed. Herdsmanship will be done by exhibitors only.

Banners will be awarded to the top chapter exhibiting beef, sheep, dairy, swine, goats, or poultry/rabbits. At least one exhibitor with 5 beef or dairy animals, or 7 head of goats, sheep, or swine must show animals for the chapter to be eligible. Each member will receive premium points for Herdsmanship using the Danish system.

    - (1) animals kept clean at all times
    - (2) adequate bedding used
    - (3) animals fed & watered regularly
    - (4) blankets used properly

  - (a) exhibitor card displayed, fully and neatly completed (b) equipment kept in show boxes
  - (c) feed kept in feed aisle, not on top of pen
  - (d) stalls/pens kept clean & dry - STRIPPED/REBEDDED DAILY!
  - (e) aisles kept clean and free for spectators
  - (f) large equipment & tack areas labeled with exhibitor's name & chapter, and no for sale signs exhibited on pens or stalls.

  - (c) Be in the quantity and manner called for in Premium List.
  - (d) Have been harvested since last year's State Fair. (e) Vegetables with tops must have 1/2" on top.
3. Like exhibits may not be entered in both Commercial Truck Crop Division and Garden Crop Division. Free passes are not given to crop exhibitors.
4. All entries, except Landscape Design, will be judged using the Danish System with scoring as follows:
  - Blue - exceptional quality**
  - Red - meets bare minimum trade standards**
  - White - may not meet trade standard, but is marketable, free from disease, insects, damage, etc.**
  - NP - no placing**

**FLOWER HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS**

1. Cut flowers in late afternoon the day before, or early morning the day they of show; put immediately in deep lukewarm water. Keep out of drafts, in a dark place.
2. Select material in its prime and make sure it is pest free.
3. Name varieties if possible.
4. Roses should have a healthy stem, shown with foliage, and blooms should be one-third to one-half open.
5. Disbud tea roses.
6. Gladioli should have five to seven florets open, long stiff, straight stems and one leaf.
7. Dahlias should have two leaves, no buds, and centers should show, only in single or collarette varieties.
8. When exhibiting two or more blooms, all should be the same size.

**Hints for Landscape Design**

1. Barkdust should be pushed down.
2. Each display needs attractive border or line on its edges.
3. All pots should be hidden and should not be mounded.
4. Plans need to be drawn to scale. Consult Sunset's Landscaping Illustrated or Landscaping by Jack E. Ingels.
5. Pay attention to details. For example, cover plastic tarps, pool-edges, remove barkdust from plant foliage.
6. Water, if used, should make noise.
7. Do not over plant. Allow for some plant expansion.
8. The plan should be adaptable to any backyard area. It should be developed for current & long term aesthetics.

A banner will be presented to the chapter earning the most points in the mechanics division.

1. All shop entries must be the product of Agricultural Education students or active FFA members during the current year.
