Master Recycler Two-time Award Winner

On Wednesday, August 24th, the Marion County Board of Commissioners presented Deputy Bob Ferris with the 2011 Association of Oregon Recyclers Recycler of the Year Award in the government category. A two decade veteran of the Marion County Jail, Deputy Ferris, who is also a Master Recycler, has worked for many years to improve re-



cycling and waste reduction efforts at the county jail. As a result of Deputy Ferris' efforts, the county jail is now realizing savings of over \$20,000 per year by decreasing the size and frequency of garbage collection.

In addition to the Association of Oregon Recyclers Recycler of the Year Award, Deputy Ferris was awarded the 2011 Mid-Valley Green Awards Recycler of the Year in April. A few examples of Deputy Ferris' recycling and waste reduction efforts include:

- → Increased recycling from five co-mingled bins per week to 14 co-mingled bins per week which allowed the jail to go from a 40-yard dumpster to a 30-yard dumpster. Total savings for the year was approximately \$7,540.
- → Reduced the number of times the 30 yard dumpster was picked up by 20 times a year resulting in \$9,280 in annual savings.

- → Switched from paper to cloth towels for cell clean-up for an annual savings of about \$12,000.
- ★ Recycles about 7,800 pounds of plastic per year and reduced the use of plastic bags by 66,500 per year.



→ On August 1, 2011, began collecting used bars of soap. The soap is recycled by a company called "Clean the World" and is sanitized and given away in 40 different countries.

The Board of Commissioners expressed their appreciation of Deputy Ferris' efforts and the example he sets for the community. Commissioner Sam Brentano remarked on his experience in the waste industry and previous attempts at waste reduction at the jail. He said, "For a successful program, it takes someone dedicated to take ownership of the program. I think we've found that person in Bob." Marion County Sheriff Jason Myers additionally commented, "One of our core responsibilities is the efficient use of taxpayer funds. Deputy Ferris lives out that vision for the Sheriff's Office."

Plastic Bottle Recycling goes Local!

More than a year behind schedule, construction on the \$10 million OR-PET bottle recycle plant at the Port of St. Helens is at long last under way To mark this milestone, city and county representatives joined state officials gathered at the site on Aug. 31 for an official groundbreaking ceremony.

The 25,000 square foot facility will process millions of polyethylene terephthalate (PET), a food-grade plastic commonly used in beverage bottles, each year. ORPET expects to be up and running by January 2012.

ORPET is being developed as a collaborative effort between the Oregon Beverage Recycling Cooperative and recycling developers Tom Leaptrott and Dennis Denton. Bringing the new plant to St. Helens became possible once Oregon's Bottle Bill was updated in 2009 to include water bottles in the state's refund law which mandates a minimum return value of 5 cents per bottle.

Denton said the company's plan is to begin putting the roof on the building within the next week and then begin importing needed machinery after that.



What seems to have those attending the groundbreaking most excited is the infusion of 25 jobs ORPET is expecting to bring to Columbia County's economy, and possibly another 25 jobs if the recycling plant is successful. Many of those jobs are considered to be somewhat higher paying jobs than are average for the county. -from the St. Helens Chronicle

Join the EPA's Food Recovery Challenge


How much of your food and money are you literally throwing away?



Initially, the recycled clothing was for industrial use, but much was found to be reusable and is now passed on to nonprofits for distribution to people in need.

Outdoorsy clothing maker Patagonia Inc. hopes to get its customers to reduce their footprint through its Common Threads Initiative. Patagonia will while repair its items that break and will partner with eBay to resell old garments.

A long-elusive goal of environmental advocates might be close to becoming a reality,

after the California legislature passed a bill that would require owners of apartment buildings to offer recycling services to their tenants.

For years, environmental groups and California legislators have tried to pass bills that would bring recycling services to the over 7 million residents of the state who live in apartments. The most recent came last year when a bill passed the legislature, but was vetoed by then Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger.

But with a new governor in office, environmental advocates are bullish that the current bill will be signed into law.

Hot Compost!

A fire recently broke out at the Marion County compost facility located at Brown's Island Demolition landfill.

The fire was reported the morning of Sunday, August 29th in a pile of fresh debris staged for composting.

Salem Firefighters responded and put



out the bulk of the blaze and Marion County Environmental Services staff continued the effort by spreading the smoldering

pile and putting out hot spots over the next week.

The Marion County facility collects material from it's own parks as well as Salem's, and also accepts leaves collected in fall Leaf Hauls.

Existing compost was not affected, but the fire could limit supplies of compost from the facility next year.
