Commissioner Willis called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Ronald Sterba:

- Mr. Sterba is a board member of the Southeast Mill Creek Neighborhood Association (SEMCA);
- Residents have safety concerns for children living in an area of SEMCA that is isolated due to roads:
 - o The area is south of Highway 22, between Cordon Road and Lancaster Drive; and
 - o The area is isolated from Miller Elementary School and Houck Middle School.
- Children currently use Lancaster Drive and Rickey Street to get to school:
 - A safer route to school is needed.
- The Lancaster Drive and Cordon Road bridges over Highway 22 are not safe in the event there is an earthquake;
- Mr. Sterba gave the Commissioners a copy of a proposed solution that has been in the works for approximately one and a half years; and
- Mr. Sterba met with the Oregon Department of Transportation, and they say that they do not have the funds to fix the problem.

Board discussion:

- Last week, the Salem-Keizer Area Transportation Study (SKATS) signed a letter in support of a pedestrian bridge in the area:
 - o SKATS is aware of the problem, and they are working on a solution.

PRESENTATION

1. Strategic Economic Development Corporation (SEDCOR) of the Mid-Willamette Valley Quarterly Report. –Adam Franco, Marion County Community Services, Economic Development Specialist; Erik Andersson, SEDCOR President; and Nick Harville, SEDCOR, Marion County Business Retention and Expansion Manager

Summary of presentation:

- The county has a five-year contract with SEDCOR that is funded through lottery dollars:
 - o The contract is for \$160,000 per year.

Erik Andersson and Nick Harville, SEDCOR:

- SEDCOR leverages public and private partnerships to grow, retain, and attract high value jobs and capital investment to Marion County and other counties in the mid-Willamette Valley;
- Following are Santiam Canyon wildfire recovery efforts that SEDCOR is involved in:
 - o Mr. Harville is on the Long-Term Recovery Group (LTRG) executive committee;
 - O As of last week, case managers had 88 cases, down from 150;
 - o LTRG is interviewing for a construction liaison position:
 - The construction liaison will work with homeowners who are rebuilding to help them through the permitting and rebuilding process.
 - Sheds are still being built:
 - Approximately 24 companies came together to build 100 sheds; and
 - By May they will have built 150 sheds.
 - o Recovery in the canyon is progressing; and
 - o There are a couple of businesses who are potentially interested in coming to the canyon.
- Following are business retention and expansion projects that SEDCOR is working on:
 - Open Dental is adding a new building to their south Salem campus;
 - Metal Innovations obtained their lease at the Salem Airport, so their project is moving forward:
 - There is another aircraft company who potentially wants to get involved with Metal Innovations now that they have more space:
 - The company is not based in the United States.
 - o Mr. Harville attended a meeting on electric aircraft and how they could potentially be brought to Oregon airports:
 - The City of Salem has identified an area at the airport for a charging station.
 - The site work has started at the Dollar General site in Mill Creek:
 - It is a \$140 million project;
 - They will probably not be hiring until 2025:
 - There will be approximately 500 workers at the facility.

- It is a 900,000 square foot facility that will be used for dry goods, and it will include cold storage.
- o A HVAC warehouse and distribution facility is being built in Mill Creek:
 - Forty percent of the facility will be dedicated to manufacturing.
- A server business is looking at sites in Salem and Woodburn:
 - They could potentially provide well-paying jobs.
- Following are projects SEDCOR is working on around innovation and entrepreneurship:
 - A small business technical assistance grant was received to work with the Latino Business Alliance:
 - The first group of 30 entrepreneurs is almost done with the process that consisted of a minimum of ten hours of training:
 - This group will continue to be facilitated during networking sessions and through counseling with the Small Business Development Center.
 - The Oregon Angel Food 2023 event will be hosted in Marion County at Chemeketa's ag complex:
 - The event is for food entrepreneurs.
 - SEDCOR is partnering with Oregon State University on their strategic plan around a center for innovation excellence for food and beverage industries in the state:
 - A roundtable was held in January with local businesses.
 - SEDCOR is hosting an ag breakfast tomorrow at Chemeketa's Eola campus in west Salem to continue work on ag innovation.

Board discussion:

- There are still several hundred homes in the canyon that need to be built or repaired;
- The server business looking at the area reconditions servers and provides server service; and
- The commissioners expressed their appreciation for the work that SEDCOR does for the county.

5. Consider approval of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Beneficiary Agreement with Isaac's Room in the amount of \$250,000 for the replacement of lost revenue incurred due to the COVID-19 pandemic and expanding youth opportunities through December 31, 2026. –Debbie Gregg, Camber Schlag, and Tiffany Bulgin, Isaac's Room

Summary of presentation:

• Isaac's Room's application for ARPA funds was presented to the Board at the January 10, 2023, Management Update meeting.

Tiffany Bulgin, Isaac's Room:

- Ms. Bulgin is one of the founders of Isaac's Room;
- Isaac's Room has been in the community for over 20 years;
- Isaac's Room was started after the loss of Ms. Bulgin's first son:
 - Her work doing teenage parole probation foster care also influenced her decision to start Isaac's Room.
- Isaac's Room helps youth build the capacity to face the challenges of life:
 - o They mainly work with youth ages 16 to 21; and
 - O Youth enter the IKE Quest program that includes working out, eating together, classes, and being given a job.
- IKE Box has been open for 17 years, and a second location, Isaac's, was opened on January 19, 2019:
 - The second location doubled the number of jobs available;
 - The second location also gives youth the opportunity to learn cooking and baking skills;
 - Isaac's has done really well; and
 - O The profit from the businesses goes into the IKE Quest program.

- The ARPA funds will allow Isaac's to expand, which will add 10 to 15 jobs including the following:
 - o Entry level positions;
 - o Prep work positions; and
 - Dishwashing positions.
- The ARPA funds will also allow the program to expand and to serve more youth:
 - o The funds will be utilized for the coaches and individuals who run the program.

Board discussion:

- The program helps youth learn that they can help others get better, and that they have a purpose;
- The commissioners thanked Ms. Bulgin for the work that she does;
- The youth in the program are learning how to serve others;
- The ARPA funds will help Isaac's Room stabilize and expand; and
- The community benefits from Isaac's Room as a place to gather, and as a good example of how the community invests in its youth.

MOTION: Commissioner Cameron moved to approve the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Beneficiary Agreement with Isaac's Room in the amount of \$250,000 for the replacement of lost revenue incurred due to the COVID-19 pandemic and expanding youth opportunities through December 31, 2026. Seconded by Commissioner Bethell; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

6. Consider the adoption of an administrative ordinance granting Zone Change/ Comprehensive Plan Change (ZC/CP) Case #22-002/Jason Feusner. —Austin Barnes

Summary of presentation:

- The application is for approval to change the zoning on a property from Acreage Residential with a 10-acre minimum to Acreage Residential with a 2-acre minimum;
- The Hearings Officer held a duly noticed public hearing on July 7, 2022;
- On August 11, 2022, the hearings officer issued a report recommending the Board approve the request;
- The board held a duly noticed public hearing on the application on December 14, 2022, considered all the evidence in the record, and approved the request;
- The ordinance and findings have been prepared, and the notice of adoption was given on January 25, 2023;
- The administrative ordinance is now set for formal adoption;
- The board has the following options:
 - o Adopt the ordinance as written;

- o Direct staff to prepare a modified ordinance; or
- O Choose not to sign and adopt the ordinance at this time.
- Staff recommends that the board adopt the ordinance as written.

Board discussion:

• Ms. Vetto clarified that the motion would be to adopt the ordinance as written, and that the title would be read only once.

MOTION: Commissioner Bethell moved that the chair read the ordinance by title only once. Seconded by Commissioner Cameron; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

Commissioner Willis read the title of the ordinance only once.

MOTION: Commissioner Bethell moved to adopt the administrative ordinance as written. Seconded by Commissioner Cameron; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.
