Board Appointment – Fair Board

7. Consider approval of an order appointing Amy Goulter-Allen to the Marion County Fair Board with a term ending December 31, 2024. –Kelli Weese

Summary of presentation:

- Ms. Goulter-Allen has been a Marion County Fair Board Key Volunteer since 2015;
- Before becoming a key volunteer, she was the Future Farmers of America (FFA) representative at the fair board meetings; and
- The Marion County Fair Board unanimously voted to recommend Ms. Goulter-Allen as a key volunteer for the fair board.

Amy Goulter-Allen:

- Ms. Goulter-Allen expressed the following:
 - o The Marion County Fair Board has been a big part of her life;
 - She is excited to become a voting member;
 - o She has been involved with the board for multiple years; and
 - She looks forward to continuing to improve the fair board.

Board discussion:

• The commissioners thanked Ms. Goulter-Allen for her hard work and her commitment to the fair.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

8. Consider approval of Amendment #3 to the Contract for Services with Marimea Bodunov to add \$70,000 for a new contract total of \$150,000 to provide adult foster care services through June 30, 2023. —Phil Blea

Summary of presentation:

- The amended contract is with Marimea Bodunov; and
- Adult foster care allows individuals who are not Medicaid eligible, or who require service not medically covered, to maintain placement and obtain needed services.

Board discussion:

- The funding is pass-through dollars that the county receives from the Oregon Health Authority (OHA):
 - o The care provider invoices the county for services that are not Medicaid eligible;
 - o The invoices are reviewed; and
 - O An invoice for services is paid with the pass-through funds.
- Adult foster care is outside of the county's Behavioral Health organization;
- This does not include individuals with an Intellectual and Developmental Disability (IDD);
- Individuals in adult foster care are unable to sustain living on their own, and require assistance to live semi-independently:
 - This can include individuals with some of the following:
 - A Severe and Persistent Mental Illness (SPMI); and
 - A co-occurring Persistent Mental Illness (PMI) population with drug and alcohol addiction.
- Some of the individuals in adult foster care have spent time in the state hospital as well as long-term placements;
- The individuals are not eligible for Medicaid:
 - The county will reimburse the amount that is not Medicaid eligible so that the individual does not lose their placement; and
 - Services are provided until the individual becomes Medicaid eligible or alternative funding is found.

Motion: Commissioner Bethell moved to approve Amendment #3 to the Contract for Services with Marimea Bodunov to add \$70,000 for a new contract total of \$150,000 to provide adult foster care services through June 30, 2023. Seconded by Commissioner Cameron; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

PUBLIC WORKS

9. Consider approval of a resolution to adopt the Marion County Multi-Jurisdiction Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMA). –Gregory Walsh

Summary of presentation:

- The Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMA) has been approved by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA);
- The board and staff have had previous discussions regarding the plan; and
- The HMA allows the county to apply for grants and request funding for improvement and mitigation projects that would minimize the impacts of natural hazards to communities.

Board discussion:

- Relevant hazard concerns for the county include some of the following:
 - o Flooding;
 - o Wildfires;
 - o Snow and ice storms;
 - o High wind events;
 - o Tornadoes; and
 - o Dam failures.
- The HMA will be used to develop plans that will assist the county in effectively responding to a disaster, both natural and manmade;
- It is important to build preparedness including emergency alerts and a warning system for the public;
- A large earthquake off the coast of Oregon could impact approximately seven million people across the west coast within ten minutes or less:
 - o A large earthquake would cause additional smaller hazards;
 - o Numerous natural and manmade hazards would occur simultaneously including hazards involving the following:
 - Water:
 - Water purification and water lines may be impacted.
 - Power;
 - Gas;
 - Sewage; and
 - Landslides.
 - Firefighting capabilities would be severely diminished due to impacts to roads and the water infrastructure.
- Resiliency mitigation for earthquakes is part of the HMA:
 - Addressing the small concerns can mitigate the overall impacts of the larger concerns.
- Training and planning for foreseeable risks is anticipated;
- Educating the public and building awareness is important:

- o Community preparedness events are held to teach individuals how to prepare for a disaster;
- Staff has spent time collaborating with partners in other jurisdictions to help them build awareness and preparedness for a disaster; and
- o It is important for individuals to personally prepare for a disaster.

MOTION: Commissioner Cameron moved to approve a resolution to adopt the Marion County Multi-Jurisdiction Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMA). Seconded by Commissioner Bethell; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.
