

1. PARTIES TO AGREEMENT

This Agreement between Health and Human Services, hereafter referred to as MCHHS and Sheriff's Office, hereafter referred to as MCSO, both Departments of Marion County, a political subdivision of the state of Oregon.

2. RECITALS

WHEREAS, on September 23, 2024, the US Department of Justice (USDOJ) Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) awarded Marion County a funding opportunity for the Criminal and Juvenile Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program (ALN 16.745), entitled 2024 BJA FY24 Connect and Protect: Law Enforcement Behavioral Health Response Program, under Award Number: 15PBJA-24-GG-02915-MENT; and

WHEREAS, the Grant is designed to support law enforcement-behavioral health cross-system collaboration to improve public safety responses and outcomes for individuals with mental health disorders (MHDs) or co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders (MHSUDs); and

WHEREAS, MCHHS and MCSO will collaborate to implement the Grant program by co-locating a MCSO law enforcement officer and a qualified mental health professional in a vehicle together to respond to and follow up on behavioral health crisis calls in Marion County, Oregon; and

WHEREAS, MCHHS is designated as the primary recipient of the Grant funds and is passing the funds to MCSO as the sub-recipient for the purpose of implementing the program objectives; and

WHEREAS, both Parties recognize the importance of adhering to all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and guidelines in the implementation of this program and the use of Grant funds.

3. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

In the event of any inconsistency or conflict among the documents that comprise this Agreement, the order of precedence shall be as follows:

1. Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA) requirements
2. Applicable federal laws and regulations
3. Exhibit A – Federal Award Package

4. Exhibit B – Appendix II to Part 200 of the Code of Federal Regulations
5. Exhibit C – Federal Funding Info for Subrecipients
6. Other exhibits and attachments to this Agreement
7. The main body of this Agreement

4. PURPOSE

- 4.1 The purpose of this Agreement is to establish the terms under which MCHHS and MCSO will collaborate to implement the 2024 BJA FY24 Connect and Protect: Law Enforcement Behavioral Health Response Program in Marion County, Oregon.
- 4.2 MCSO will provide Mobile Crisis Services to MCHHS by re-establishing a successful law enforcement/behavioral health model to serve Marion County to improve the outcomes for individuals experiencing mental health and substance abuse challenges, reduce recidivism, and connect to valuable stabilization resources, with the use of the Connect and Protect funds.
- 4.3 This Agreement outlines the responsibilities of each Party, the financial arrangements, reporting requirements, and other essential aspects of the program implementation.

5. TERM AND TERMINATION

- 5.1 This Agreement shall be effective upon all signatures through **September 30, 2027**, unless sooner terminated or extended as provided herein.
- 5.2 This agreement may be terminated by mutual consent of both parties at any time or by either party upon 30 days' notice in writing. Any such termination of this agreement shall be without prejudice.

6. FUNDING AND BILLING

- 6.1 The total amount paid under this Agreement shall not exceed **\$804,572.00**.
- 6.2 MCHHS shall pass through \$450,000.00 of the Grant funds to MCSO for the implementation of the program.
- 6.3 MCHHS shall pay MCSO an additional \$354,572.00 for the following items:
 - a. Materials;
 - b. Supplies;
 - c. Administrative costs; and
 - d. A one-time fleet purchase, which will include:

- (1) Lease of fleet vehicle; and
- (2) Vehicle upfit costs.

- 6.4 MCHHS shall pay MCSO quarterly progress payments upon MCHHS's approval of MCSO's expenditure reports submitted to MCHHS for completed Services, but only after MCHHS has determined that MCSO has completed, and MCHHS has accepted the completed Services.
- 6.5 MCSO shall use the funds solely for the purposes outlined in this Agreement and in accordance with the Grant requirements.
- 6.6 Payments under this Agreement shall be made on a cost reimbursement basis:
 - a. MCSO will submit an expenditure report for the costs associated with providing payment under this agreement.
 - b. MCHHS will provide payment using the County's journal entry process to reimburse personnel costs upon receipt of the expenditure reports provided by MCSO.

7. STATEMENT OF WORK

- 7.1 UNDER THE TERMS OF THIS AGREEMENT, MCHHS SHALL:
 - a. Serve as the primary recipient of the Grant Funds.
 - b. Pass the designated portion of the Grants funds to MCSO as the sub-recipient.
 - c. Provide a Qualified Mental Health Professional (QMHP) who will be coupled with a law enforcement officer to provide assistance with dispatched calls.
 - d. The QMHP will begin and end their shift at the Psychiatric Crisis Center. The law enforcement officer will pick up and drop off the QMHP from the Psychiatric Crisis Center at the beginning and end of each shift.
 - e. MCHHS and MCSO Supervisory team will meet quarterly to review status of the team, coordinate schedules, identify areas of improvement, and maintain a collaborative effort.
 - f. Provide Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) and Mental Health First Aid training to MCSO enforcement officers.
 - g. Collaborate with MCSO to meet with Community Based Organizations (CBOs) serving population-specific groups that are disproportionately impacted for the duration of the grant.
 - h. Receive input from Community groups into methods of deployment, training recommendations, and data collection efforts.

- i. Create and distribute Customer Satisfaction Surveys available in English, Spanish, and Russian.
- j. Collaborate with MCSO to provide quarterly reports to County leadership, CBOs and the following County Advisory Boards:
 - (1) Mental Health Advisory Committee (MHAC)
 - (2) Local Public Safety Coordinating Council (LPSCC)
 - (3) Local Alcohol & Drug Planning Commission (LADPC)
- k. Track and monitor the following program outputs:
 - (1) Number of MCRT dispatch calls received
 - (2) Number of contacts made in person and through phone
 - (3) Number of screenings performed
 - (4) Number of referrals made
 - (5) Number of individuals who required custody
 - (6) Number of partner meetings that were facilitated or attended
 - (7) Number of completed satisfaction surveys

7.2 UNDER THE TERMS OF THIS AGREEMENT, MCSO SHALL:

- a. Act as the sub-recipient of the Grants funds passed through by MCHHS.
- b. Provide law enforcement officers to work alongside a MCHHS QMHP.
- c. Collaborate with MCHHS in responding to and following up on behavioral health crisis calls.
- d. Provide trained Officer(s) working ten-hour shifts, four days per week and primarily taking calls from dispatch that have a mental health component and assist other agencies throughout the County with mental health calls.
- e. The Law Enforcement partner will pick up and drop off the QMHP from the Psychiatric Crisis Center at the beginning and end of each shift.
- f. Collaborate with MCHHS to meet with Community Based Organizations (CBOs) serving population-specific groups that are disproportionately impacted for the duration of the grant.

g. Collaborate with MCHHS to provide quarterly reports to County leadership, CBOs and the following County Advisory Boards:

- (1) Mental Health Advisory Committee (MHAC)
- (2) Local Public Safety Coordinating Council (LPSCC)
- (3) Local Alcohol & Drug Planning Commission (LADPC)

8. COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS

The parties agree that both shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws and ordinances applicable to the work to be done under this agreement. The parties agree that this agreement shall be administered and construed under the laws of the state of Oregon.

9. NONDISCRIMINATION

The parties agree to comply with all applicable requirements of Federal and State civil rights and rehabilitation statutes, rules and regulations in the performance of this agreement.

10. MERGER CLAUSE

Parties concur and agree that this agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties. No waiver, consent, modification or change to the terms of this agreement shall bind either party unless in writing and signed by both parties. There are no understandings, agreements, or representations, oral or written, not specified herein regarding this agreement. Parties, by the signatures below of their authorized representatives, hereby agree to be bound by its term and conditions.

Condition 2

Compliance with general appropriations-law restrictions on the use of federal funds (FY 2024)

The recipient, and any subrecipient ("subgrantee") at any tier, must comply with all applicable restrictions on the use of federal funds set out in federal appropriations statutes. Pertinent restrictions that may be set out in applicable appropriations acts are indicated at <https://ojp.gov/funding/Explore/FY24AppropriationsRestrictions.htm>, and are incorporated by reference here.

Failure to comply with one or more award requirements -- whether a condition set out in full below, a condition incorporated by reference below, or an assurance or certification related to conduct during the award period -- may result in OJP taking appropriate action with respect to the recipient and the award. Among other things, the OJP may withhold award funds, disallow costs, or suspend or terminate the award. DOJ, including OJP, also may take other legal action as appropriate.

Effect of failure to address audit issues

Condition 5

Condition 10

Condition 12

The recipient, and any subrecipient ("subgrantee") at any tier, must comply with all applicable requirements of 28 C.F.R. Part 42, specifically including any applicable requirements in Subpart E of 28 C.F.R. Part 42 that relate to an equal employment opportunity program.

Among other items, 28 C.F.R. § 42.106(d), 28 C.F.R. § 42.405(c), and 28 C.F.R. § 42.505(f) contain notice requirements that covered recipients must follow regarding the dissemination of information regarding federal nondiscrimination requirements.

Condition 13

Determination of suitability to interact with participating minors

SCOPE. This condition applies to this award if it is indicated -- in the application for the award (as approved by DOJ)(or in the application for any subaward, at any tier), the DOJ funding announcement (solicitation), or an associated federal statute -- that a purpose of some or all of the activities to be carried out under the award (whether by the recipient, or a subrecipient at any tier) is to benefit a set of individuals under 18 years of age.

4. Rules of construction

A. Staff involved in the hiring process

For purposes of this condition, persons "who are or will be involved in activities under this award" specifically includes (without limitation) any and all recipient (or any subrecipient) officials or other staff who are or will be involved in the hiring process with respect to a position that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with award funds.

B. Employment eligibility confirmation with E-Verify

For purposes of satisfying the requirement of this condition regarding verification of employment eligibility, the recipient (or any subrecipient) may choose to participate in, and use, E-Verify (www.e-verify.gov), provided an appropriate person authorized to act on behalf of the recipient (or subrecipient) uses E-Verify (and follows the proper E-Verify procedures, including in the event of a "Tentative Nonconfirmation" or a "Final Nonconfirmation") to confirm employment eligibility for each hiring for a position in the United States that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with award funds.

Encouragement of policies to ban text messaging while driving

Pursuant to Executive Order 13513, "Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," 74 Fed. Reg. 51225 (October 1, 2009), DOJ encourages recipients and subrecipients ("subgrantees") to adopt and enforce policies banning employees from text messaging while driving any vehicle during the course of performing work funded by this award, and to establish workplace safety policies and conduct education, awareness, and other outreach to decrease crashes caused by distracted drivers.

Condition 17

Condition 18

Restrictions and certifications regarding non-disclosure agreements and related matters

No recipient or subrecipient ("subgrantee") under this award, or entity that receives a procurement contract or subcontract with any funds under this award, may require any employee or contractor to sign an internal confidentiality agreement or statement that prohibits or otherwise restricts, or purports to prohibit or restrict, the reporting (in accordance with law) of waste, fraud, or abuse to an investigative or law enforcement representative of a federal department or agency authorized to receive such information.

The foregoing is not intended, and shall not be understood by the agency making this award, to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.

1. In accepting this award, the recipient--

a. represents that it neither requires nor has required internal confidentiality agreements or statements from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above; and

b. certifies that, if it learns or is notified that it is or has been requiring its employees or contractors to execute agreements or statements that prohibit or otherwise restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict), reporting of waste, fraud, or abuse as described above, it will immediately stop any further obligations of award funds, will provide prompt written notification to the federal agency making this award, and will resume (or permit resumption of) such obligations only if expressly authorized to do so by that agency.

2. If the recipient does or is authorized under this award to make subawards ("subgrants"), procurement contracts, or both--

a. it represents that--

(1) it has determined that no other entity that the recipient's application proposes may or will receive award funds (whether through a subaward ("subgrant"), procurement contract, or subcontract under a procurement contract) either requires or has required internal confidentiality agreements or statements from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above; and

(2) it has made appropriate inquiry, or otherwise has an adequate factual basis, to support this representation; and

b. it certifies that, if it learns or is notified that any subrecipient, contractor, or subcontractor entity that receives funds under this award is or has been requiring its employees or contractors to execute agreements or statements that prohibit or otherwise restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict), reporting of waste, fraud, or abuse as described above, it will immediately stop any further obligations of award funds to or by that entity, will provide prompt written notification to the federal agency making this award, and will resume (or permit resumption of) such obligations only if expressly authorized to do so by that agency.

Condition 19

OJP Training Guiding Principles

Any training or training materials that the recipient -- or any subrecipient ("subgrantee") at any tier -- develops or delivers with OJP award funds must adhere to the OJP Training Guiding Principles for Grantees and Subgrantees, available at <https://www.ojp.gov/funding/implement/training-guiding-principles-grantees-and-subgrantees>.

Condition 20

Specific post-award approval required to use a noncompetitive approach in any procurement contract that would

exceed \$250,000

The recipient, and any subrecipient ("subgrantee") at any tier, must comply with all applicable requirements to obtain specific advance approval to use a noncompetitive approach in any procurement contract that would exceed the Simplified Acquisition Threshold (currently, \$250,000). This condition applies to agreements that -- for purposes of federal grants administrative requirements -- OJP considers a procurement "contract" (and therefore does not consider a subaward).

Condition 22

Required training for Grant Award Administrator and Financial Manager

The Grant Award Administrator and all Financial Managers for this award must have successfully completed an "OJP financial management and grant administration training" by 120 days after the date of the recipient's acceptance of the award. Successful completion of such a training on or after January 1, 2021, will satisfy this condition.

In the event that either the Grant Award Administrator or a Financial Manager for this award changes during the period of performance, the new Grant Award Administrator or Financial Manager must have successfully completed an "OJP financial management and grant administration training" by 120 calendar days after the date the Entity Administrator enters updated Grant Award Administrator or Financial Manager information in JustGrants. Successful completion of such a training on or after January 1, 2021, will satisfy this condition.

Condition 23

Compliance with 41 U.S.C. 4712 (including prohibitions on reprisal; notice to employees)

The recipient (and any subrecipient at any tier) must comply with, and is subject to, all applicable provisions of 41 U.S.C. 4712, including all applicable provisions that prohibit, under specified circumstances, discrimination against an employee as reprisal for the employee's disclosure of information related to gross mismanagement of a federal grant, a gross waste of federal funds, an abuse of authority relating to a federal grant, a substantial and specific danger to public health or safety, or a violation of law, rule, or regulation related to a federal grant.

Condition 26

Condition 27

Condition 29

Restrictions on "lobbying"

In general, as a matter of federal law, federal funds awarded by OJP may not be used by the recipient, or any subrecipient ("subgrantee") at any tier, either directly or indirectly, to support or oppose the enactment, repeal, modification, or adoption of any law, regulation, or policy, at any level of government. See 18 U.S.C. 1913. (There may be exceptions if an applicable federal statute specifically authorizes certain activities that otherwise would be barred by law.)

Condition 34

The recipient agrees that no funds under this grant award (including via subcontract or subaward, at any tier) may be used for unmanned aircraft systems (UAS), which includes unmanned aircraft vehicles (UAV), or for any accompanying accessories to support UAS.

Condition 35

The recipient agrees to comply with OJP grant monitoring guidelines, protocols, and procedures, and to cooperate with BJA and OCFO on all grant monitoring requests, including requests related to desk reviews, enhanced programmatic desk reviews, and/or site visits. The recipient agrees to provide to BJA and OCFO all documentation necessary to complete monitoring tasks, including documentation related to any subawards made under this award. Further, the recipient agrees to abide by reasonable deadlines set by BJA and OCFO for providing the requested documents. Condition 36

Condition 37

Body armor - compliance with NIJ standards and other requirements

Ballistic-resistant and stab-resistant body armor purchased with award funds may be purchased at any threat level, make or model, from any distributor or manufacturer, as long as the body armor has been tested and found to comply with applicable National Institute of Justice ballistic or stab standards, and is listed on the NIJ Compliant Body Armor Model List. In addition, ballistic-resistant and stab-resistant body armor purchased must be made in the United States and must be uniquely fitted, as set forth in 34 U.S.C. 10202(c)(1)(A). The latest NIJ standard information and the NIJ Compliant Body Armor List may be found by following the links located on the NIJ Body Armor page: <https://nij.ojp.gov/topics/equipment-and-technology/body-armor>. In addition, if recipient uses funds under this award to purchase body armor, the recipient is strongly encouraged to have a "mandatory wear" policy in effect. Condition 38

Condition 39

The recipient agrees to cooperate with any assessments, national evaluation efforts, or information or data collection requests, including, but not limited to, the provision of any information required for the assessment or evaluation of any activities within this project.

Condition 40

FFATA reporting: Subawards and executive compensation

The recipient must comply with applicable requirements to report first-tier subawards ("subgrants") of \$30,000 or more and, in certain circumstances, to report the names and total compensation of the five most highly compensated executives of the recipient and first-tier subrecipients (first-tier "subgrantees") of award funds. Condition 44

To the extent that direct services will be provided to participants as a component of the JMHCP project, grant funds must be used to support a target population that includes adults who: 1) have been diagnosed as having MI or CMISA or manifest obvious signs of MI or CMISA during arrest or confinement or before any court; 2) have been unanimously approved for participation in a program funded under this award by (as appropriate) the relevant prosecuting attorney, defense attorney, probation or corrections official, judge, and a representative from the relevant mental health agency, and having been determined by each of these relevant individuals to not pose a risk of violence to any person in the program, or the public; and 3) have not been charged with or convicted of any sex offense (as defined at 34 U.S.C. ?2 0911) or any offense relating to the sexual exploitation of children, or murder or assault with intent to commit murder.

Condition 45

A match of 20% is required for years 1&2 combined. Match may be met through any combination of percentage between years 1 & 2 as long as the combined total for both years is 20%. Recipient understands that significant project delays (over 90 days) may lead to increases in the required cost match, pursuant to 34 USC 10651(d), and agrees to cooperate with BJA on any budget revisions that may be necessary, particularly following such significant project delays. Recipient further understands that the required match set forth in the proposed budget and any budget revisions will be reviewed in accordance with statutory requirements, leading to a total match amount for which the recipient will be responsible. Condition 46

Limit on use of grant funds for grantees' employees' salaries

With respect to this award, federal funds may not be used to pay cash compensation (salary plus bonuses) to any employee of the award recipient at a rate that exceeds 110% of the maximum annual salary payable to a member of the federal government's Senior Executive Service (SES) at an agency with a Certified SES Performance Appraisal System for that year. **APPENDIX II TO PART 200—CONTRACT PROVISIONS FOR NON-FEDERAL ENTITY
CONTRACTS UNDER FEDERAL AWARDS**

- Contracts for more than the simplified acquisition threshold currently set at \$150,000, which is the inflation adjusted amount determined by the Civilian County Acquisition Council and the Defense Acquisition Regulations Council (Councils) as authorized by 41 U.S.C. 1908, must address administrative, contractual, or legal remedies in instances where contractors violate or breach contract terms, and provide for such sanctions and penalties as appropriate.
- All contracts in excess of \$10,000 must address termination for cause and for convenience by the non-Federal entity including the manner by which it will be affected and the basis for settlement.
- Equal Employment Opportunity. Except as otherwise provided under 41 CFR Part 60, all contracts that meet the definition of “federally assisted construction contract” in 41 CFR Part 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 CFR 60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, “Equal Employment Opportunity” (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 CFR Part, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, “Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,” and implementing regulations at 41 CFR part 60, “Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor.”
- Davis-Bacon Act, as amended (40 U.S.C. 3141-3148). When required by Federal program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5, “Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction”). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency. The contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland “Anti-Kickback” Act (40 U.S.C. 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 3, “Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States”). The Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.
- Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. 3701-3708). Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5). Under 40 U.S.C. 3702 of the Act, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that

the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.

- **Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement.** If the Federal award meets the definition of “funding agreement” under 37 CFR §401.2 (a) and the recipient or Subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that “funding agreement,” the recipient or Subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 CFR Part 401, “Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements,” and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency.
