- Introducing new multidisciplinary team collaboration called HEAT (High Enforcement Action Team)
- Collaborative effort between DA's office, sheriff's office, and local law enforcement
- Specific focus on:
 - Violence prevention.
 - Firearms reduction.
 - o Drug-related crime
- Geographic concentration on downtown and East Salem.
- No additional resources allocated.
- Primary goal is to centralize information and coordinate resource deployment.

- Supported by sheriff's data analyst.
- Praised for its data-driven approach to addressing community safety.

2. 2023-2025 JUSTICE REINVESTMENT PROGRAM (JRP) GRANT AMENDMENT REOUEST

Summary of presentation:

- Comprehensive review of Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) position rebalancing.
- Five specific financial adjustments proposed.
- Rationale for adjustments:
 - o Staff retirements.
 - o Position changes.

- o Budget optimization.
- Specific financial movements between positions.
- Deputy District Attorney position found to be more expensive than initially budgeted.
- Funds reallocated from less expensive positions.
- Amendment request prepared for Criminal Justice Commission.
- Detailed financial tracking and transparency emphasized.

MOTION: A motion was made to pass the 2023-2025 JRP Grant Amendment. Seconded. Motion passed unanimously

3. UPDATE ON INDIVIDUALS SERVED BY JUSTICE REINVESTMENT

-Mike Hartford

Summary of presentation:

- Total of 2,851 unduplicated clients served in the 2015-2017 biennium.
- Declining service numbers over time due to:
 - o Increased program costs.
 - o High inflation rates.
 - o Reduced funding availability.
- Comprehensive program breakdown:
 - o De Muniz Resource Center (recently closed).
 - o Housing subsidies (increasingly challenging due to rising costs).
 - o Jail re-entry programs.
 - o Transition from jail to community program.
 - o Peer support services.
 - Prison diversion initiatives.
 - Substance use treatment.
 - Stabilization mentor program.
- Notable program transitions:
 - o Jail re-entry program replaced by evidence-based transition program.
 - o Significant increase in client services in some programs.
 - o Resource Center to reopen with Pathfinders in July.
- Challenges highlighted:
 - o Reduced funding.
 - o Increasing service costs.
 - Need for creative resource allocation.
