# **GREEN** cleaners

If you read the list of chemicals in a typical household cleaner, you might be surprised to learn that many of them contain volatile organic compounds (VOC's). These compounds, upon exposure, can create a wide variety of health issues for you, your family, and the environment around you. To reduce these exposures, choose green cleaners that are made of non-toxic or less toxic substances.

Green cleaners are available at most stores that sell cleaning supplies. These cleaners use benign or less toxic chemicals that have been tested to clean well, typically don't contain VOC's, and are safest for use in the home or business environment. To know which products live up to their claims, choose one with a trusted 3rd-party certification. Each of these organizations have independently tested the product that they endorse and are not owned by the company that makes it. Here are logos to look for:









For the DIYer, making your own green cleaners is easy and affordable. Many cleaners can be made with common ingredients you already have on hand.

## Green All-purpose Cleaner Use this cleaner for just about every kind of surface, from kitchen

counters and appliances to bathroom surfaces, mirrors and walls.

2 cups water 1 cup hydrogen peroxide ¼ cup lemon juice

Add ingredients to a reused spray bottle for use at home or work.

## **Green Window Cleaner**

Perfect for streak-free windows.

2 cups warm water 1/4 cup rubbing alcohol 1/4 cup white vinegar 1 tablespoon cornstarch

Combine everything in a spray bottle, and shake well.

Many household products contain hazardous chemicals which need to be disposed of properly. Items labeled **Danger**, **Warning**, **Caution**, **or Poison** should not be tossed in your residential garbage, as this increases the potential for release of these substances into the environment. The disposal of Household

Hazardous Waste (HHW) into storm drains, either directly or indirectly as runoff, can have a significant impact on our waterways by creating toxic levels of chemicals poisonous to aquatic life. Water from storm drains does not get treated and runs directly into local waterways, so remember only rain down the drain.

Protect your loved ones and local streams by disposing of household products at the Marion County Household Hazardous Waste Facility. Some HHW items include: antifreeze, pesticides, weed killer, herbicides, fuels, pool chemicals, solvents/degreasers, spot remover, turpentine, mercury, paint thinner, and engine cleaners.

HHW is accepted free of charge from residents of Marion County. Please bring your household hazardous materials in the original retail containers with lids. Residents with containers larger than 5 gallons or multiple containers of any one substance must receive approval from Marion County prior to delivery at the HHW facility and may be charged a fee. Businesses must contact 1.503.742.7109 for an appointment and pricing.
