It will be a big leap forward in helping to promote the second "R" to help reduce waste in Marion County and could spark a wealth of creativity in our community. DIYstudio promotes **creativity** by providing students with workshops, low cost supplies and inspiration for creative endeavors.

DIYstudio promotes **community** by empowering students to become engaged and resourceful by forming community connections though workshops, open studio times, events, and art shows.

DIYstudio promotes **environmental awareness** by educating students about implementing alternative approaches to creating and by diverting materials from the solid-waste stream. When materials are donated and sold, DIY studio sorts, weighs, and records the materials to provide a full report of how many tons of materials have been diverted from the solid waste stream.

DIYstudio promotes **self-sufficiency** skills and empowers students to do-itthemselves. We encourage students to reconnect with hands-on activities to better understand the worth of materials and gain confidence in their creative abilities.

History

In the fall of 2010 Jessica Ramey opened DIY Studio in her Salem, Oregon garage. The purpose of the for-profit business was to teach art and craft classes as well as host events. In the 8 months the studio was open, over 300 attendees enrolled in a DIY Studio class or event.

In 2011, Jessica partnered with Culture Shock Community Project and Clockworks Café & Cultural Center. They offered the space and Jessica offered the supplies and free art instruc-



tion at Community Craft Nights. She sought out discarded materials from thrift shops and garage sales to use in the workshops and classes to cut down on costs. DIY Studio also received various donations of supplies from community members.

It was during that time Jessica realized that DIY Studio could better serve the community by becoming a non-profit. Gaining a non-profit status makes it easier to divert waste by offering business and individuals donation incentives as well as allows more materials to be used for creative endeavors. Best of all, the revenue from those sales will be used to fund arts education and self sustainability classes. In 2012 Jessica completed the Master Recycling coursework in Marion County. There she learned more about how she could play a role in reducing waste in the community.

When Jessica met Carlee Wright she knew she'd found a crafting kindred spirit. Carlee is one of those creatives who is good at everything and gets things done. She has founded many non-profits and knows the details of how to make a non-profit succeed. Carlee has been a continued supporter of the creative reuse concept and has been integral to establishing DIY Studio as a non-profit creative reuse center. ~ *From diystudio.net*

2050 Vision Adopted

The Oregon

Environmental Quality Commission voted unanimously Dec. 6 to adopt a plan that will help guide the state's management of materials and waste for decades to come. The document, Materials Management in Oregon: 2050 Vision and Framework for Action,

Plastic Bags, Round II The Kid Can Compost!

Plastic grocery bags have been banned in Portland, Eugene, and Corvallis, and now advocates are taking their quest to the Oregon Legislature, renewing a failed 2011 bid for a statewide ban.

As reported in the Oregonian, The bill has returned to the state Senate, albeit currently without a sponsor.

The bill would ban single-use plastic bags at checkout, with minor exceptions, and require retailers to charge 5 cents for a paper bag.

Eight year old Carter Schmidt of Traverse City, Michigan has found a niche to both help the planet and his piggy bank!

The budding entrepreneur has started his own business called

Carter's Compost. For \$5 a month he will deliver a clean 5-gallon bucket to customers for them to fill with fruit and veggie scraps, ex-



change it once a week for a clean one, and once every four weeks bring back a bucket of finished compost! His pickup and delivery are all done by bike. to round out his eco-business.

Schmidt also runs his own red worm ranch and raises chickens—all recipients of the food scraps in addition to his composters.

Paraguay is a town essentially built on top of a landfill. Garbage collectors browse

the trash for sellable goods, and children are often at risk of getting involved with drugs and gangs. When orchestra director Szaran and music teacher Favio set up a music program for local kids, they soon had more students than instruments.

That changed when they were brought something they had never seen before: a violin made out of garbage. Today, there's an entire orchestra of assembled instruments, now called The Recycled Orchestra.

This film shows how trash and recycled materials can be transformed into beautiful sounding musical instruments, but more importantly, it brings witness to the transformation of precious human beings.
