PaintCare Goes Permanent

The PaintCare pilot program in Oregon marked its third anniversary in July, and lawmakers marked the occasion by making the 2009 legislation permanent by passing a bill that eliminates the 2014 sunset provision.

PaintCare submitted its annual report for the program to the Oregon DEQ in September, detailing operational aspects and successes of the program's third year.



During this time, PaintCare maintained 100 retail and municipal collection sites, with some new sites being added in previously underserved areas. With PaintCare's infrastructure, 95 percent of Oregon residents have access to a site within 15 miles of their home.

Most of the latex was recycled into new recycled-content paint, and almost all of the oil-based paint was used for fuel blending.

Partnering government programs are realizing a direct financial savings as PaintCare covers the cost of paint transportation and recycling.

In 2009, Oregon became the first state in the nation to enact a law requiring paint manufacturers to safely manage leftover latex and oil-based paint from consumer and contractor painting jobs. This historic product stewardship legislation responds to the issue of managing leftover paint - the largest component of local household hazardous waste collection programs. Costs for safely managing leftover paint are incorporated in the purchase price of new paint.

PaintCare...

The PaintCare program is at the forefront of the producer responsibility movement, in which Oregon is a national leader. Producer responsibility means manufacturers take responsibility for reducing the lifecycle impacts of a product, including internalizing end-of-life management costs, rather than having government set up and fund collection programs for waste products.

In response to the success of the Oregon program, legislation mandating the creation of the PaintCare program has been enacted in six additional states since 2009: California, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Minnesota, Vermont, and Maine.

What's going on In our backyard?

Marion County began recycling latex paint in 2000, long before the producer responsibility legislation was enacted.

Since the start of PaintCare, however, the county has been reimbursed by the program at a pergallon rate that has saved over \$200,000!

> It has also facilitated the collection of oil-based paint. Although it is still burned for energy as when it was mixed with garbage, we are able to better account for the amount of energy recovered from this type of paint, and it has encouraged safe disposal by making it easier for residents to dispose of oil-based paint at the curb and recycling depots.

Medication Drop Off Expands

Since the County began partnering in medication collection events in 2010 there have been continuing efforts to provide year-round access to safe disposal locations.

This perseverance has paid off, and now, thanks to the commitment of participating cities, the county boasts 6 permanent locations for residents to bring unwanted and expired household medication (prescription or over-the-counter).

Gervais, Keizer, Salem, Stayton, & Woodburn residents have locations at police stations or city halls, and all other Marion County residents can take them to the administration building at the Marion County Jail. Most are open regular business hours Monday through Friday, and Salem offers 24/7 availability.

Proper disposal of medication is important to protect water quality (never pour or flush down drains!), and to keep families safe.

Put Your Cans to Work!

The Oregon Green Schools Association has launched a collection drive for plastic bottles and aluminum cans that have a deposit value. People can now donate their cans and plastic bottles (no glass) at the new collection receptacle at the Salem-Keizer Recycling & Transfer Station. The facility is located near the Gaffin Road Exit off of Highway 22 east of Salem and is open 7 days/week from 8 a.m.-5 p.m.



Marion County awarded OGSA a grant which allowed the non-profit to build three collection boxes. Republic Services has donated space at the recycling depot to collect them. Currently only one box is being used but the group plans to find two locations in Marion County to place the other boxes.



"Oregon Green Schools is a non-profit organization that helps K-12 schools establish recycling programs, save water and conserve energy. The organization works on a shoestring budget and this new source of income will help the group tremendously!" said Bailey Payne, Waste Reduction Coordinator for Marion County and OGSA Board Member. There are currently 26 schools in Marion County that are in the program and approximately 250 throughout Oregon. Every year Oregonians either recycle or throw away bottles and cans that have a five cent deposit. The five cent deposit hasn't gone up since the Bottle Bill was first enacted in 1971. In fact if you accounted for inflation, a can in 1971 would be worth twenty-three cents in today's dollars. While a nickel may not seem like much

money, a conservative estimate is that there are 260,000,000 bottles being thrown away or recycled without claiming the deposit. This works out to at \$13 million annually!

- 2/3 cup baking soda

Leaf Bounty

Feeling overwhelmed by the pile of leaves in your yard? Once you realize all the great things you



can do with them you may be begging for more from your neighbors!

- 1. *Make leafmold.* Store them in a bin or bag with airholes for a year.
- 2. *Compost them.* Combine with green materials to help break them down.
- 3. *Chop and use as mulch.* Spread thickly over exposed soil.
- 4. Condition your soil. Dig a thin layer of chopped leaves right in!
- 5. *Insulate winter veggies.* Pile 6" high over cold-hardy root veggies.
- 6. *Save them for Spring.* They will help balance out your greens.
