Are you still putting your food scraps in the garbage? If you live in Keizer, Salem, Silverton, Stayton, Jefferson, Turner, or Woodburn you can toss all of your food waste into your yard debris cart so that it can be converted into compost. Compost is a valuable amendment that adds nutrients and organic matter back into our Oregon soils. Instead of a waste product, your scraps are recycled! **Remember only food, no plastic!**

MAJOR RECYCLING CHANGES AFFECTING YOUR CART



e love to recycle in Marion County, but we've been putting the wrong things into our recycling rollcarts in hopes that they'll be recycled. This can slow or break sorting machinery and contaminate good materials. It's also one of the reasons China—the biggest buyer of recycled materials worldwide has recently placed tougher restrictions on what they'll accept.

The companies that sort our recycling, like Garten Services, have had to slow down their processes to remove nonrecyclable items and materials are piling up as they search for other markets to sell to. Some recycling companies have asked permission to temporarily dispose of recyclables that they can't sell. This has been granted for a few materials for a limited time.

This is how you can help. The following items can no longer be recycled and must be placed in the trash: egg cartons; plastic jars; clamshells/take out trays; cups; tubs (like yogurt or cottage cheese containers); caps; lids; pump bottles; aerosol cans; scrap metal. And when in doubt, toss it out. Don't stop recycling; but please only recycle items on the approved recycling list above! We work closely with recycling processors to create an accurate list based on what can be sorted and sold.

<u>RECYCLING</u> STRANGER THINGS

They can be recycled... just not in the mixed recycling cart



ELECTRONICS

All televisions, monitors, and computers are required by law to be recycled. All of these items, plus pretty much any other electronic item—big or small—may be taken to the Salem Keizer Transfer Station, North Marion Transfer Station, or Garten Services. For a list of other free locations to recycle these items visit **oregonecycles.org**



LIGHTS

Fluorescent tubes and bulbs contain mercury which can be released when
broken. Residents may take up to 10 bulbs/ tubes a day for free to the Salem Keizer Recycling & Transfer Station for recycling.



STYROFOAM

Styrofoam may be taken for free to the Fresh Start Market at 3020 Center Street NE, Salem. Only clean, block Styrofoam that snaps when folded is accepted. No peanuts or meat trays.



Clothing and other textiles that are still in acceptable condition may be donated to thrift shops or assistance agencies for reuse.

SPRING CLEANING

Do you have unused chemicals lurking in your home? If you do it's important to take them to Marion County's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection Facility to protect your family and the planet. Some HHW products include:

- **Cleaning products**
- Pesticides
- Fuels
- Solvents/degreasers
- Antifreeze (also accepted curbside when available)
- Pesticides/Herbicides/Weed Killer
- Mercury
- **Paint Thinner**
- Wood Preservatives
- **Rust Remover**
- **Engine Cleaners**
- **Pool Chemicals**

These products can be hazardous if used or disposed of incorrectly. If an item has a "Caution", "Warning" or "Danger" label it should never be poured down a drain, flushed down a toilet, or placed in the garbage.

Bring them to the collection facility instead; it's free for residents! For quantities larger than five gallons, please contact us. Businesses must make an appointment by calling

1-800-444-4244 and are charged a fee.

GREEN CLEANERS

If you read the list of chemicals in a typical household cleaner, you might be surprised to learn that many of them contain volatile organic compounds (VOCs). These compounds, upon exposure, can create a wide variety of health issues for you, your family, or the environment around you.

To reduce these exposures you may choose to switch to "green cleaners" that are made of non-toxic or less toxic substances. Green cleaners are available at most stores that sell cleaning supplies. These cleaners use less toxic chemicals, typically don't contain VOCs, and are safest for use in the home

or business environment. To know which products live up to their claims, choose one with a trusted 3rd-party certification. They include: Green Seal, UL Laboratories, Ecologo, Safer Choice, or Scientific Certification System.

For the do-it-yourselfer, making your own green cleaners is easy. In fact, you'll find that you can save money. Many cleaners can be made with simple ingredients like; vinegar, baking soda, lemon juice, or water! The internet is full of recipes and ideas, but if you need a place to start visit mcRecycles.net



EXPANDED BOTTLE BILL

You've noticed that returnable bottles are now worth a 10 cent deposit. But did you know a lot more types of bottles can earn you a dime? The Bottle Bill was amended in 2011 to add all beverages except wine, liquor, dairy or plant-based milk, meal replacement beverages, and infant formula. In other words, pretty much everything else that is a "beverage" is now worth a dime.

Examples of common beverages that are included in these container sizes:

- Coffee/tea (even if they contain milk)
- Energy and sports drinks
- Fruit and vegetable juice
- Juice smoothies
- Hard cider if 8.5% ABV or less
- Marijuana beverages
- Aloe vera juice
- Coconut water
- Non-alcohol wine
- Drinking vinegar
- Muscle Milk
- Protein shakes
- Kombucha
- Cocktail mixers
