





From: Marshall Rash, Fire Chief MCL

Subject: Snow Removal, Emergency Vehicle Access, and Fire Hydrants

We appreciate the partnerships we have with each city and truly value those relationships. The amount of snow this year has been unexpected and has put a burden on all of us. It takes all of us doing our parts to make sure we can respond to the emergency services needs of our two cities.

The fire district's priority is to keep both the Idanha and Detroit Fire Stations cleared of snow so emergency vehicles can respond and to clear parking spaces at the fire stations so our members can get to those emergency vehicles. We appreciate the assistance of each city and our own members with plows in helping us keep the stations accessible, especially since we are limited shoveling.

Last week, our staff dug out all of the city fire hydrants in Idanha and Detroit, 47 total. Some were completely buried. We ask your assistance in keeping your hydrants accessible, preferably 3 feet around all sides of the hydrant as well as a walking access path to the hydrant if appropriate.

We understand the challenges each city has had in keeping your streets accessible and cleared of snow this winter. The amount of snow and the lack of cleared city roads have created access complications for the fire district when responding to emergencies. Our 2 fire engines in Detroit and Idanha have chains on their rear tires, but that does not guarantee we can access properties.

The fire district is doing all we can, but has to limit its exposure and reduce its risks while providing for the safety of our members and the public. Because of these access issues and lack of adequate snow removal this winter, we have to provide this notice to each city that the snow situation has become a serious public safety concern because it has hampered access for our emergency vehicles and our ability to provide services. Unless your city roads are cleared and maintained, preferably at least 16 feet wide, we may not be able to adequately, safely, and in a timely manner, access structures or persons in the city in the event of a fire or other emergency.




Roads not plowed wide enough for emergency vehicles

BEFORE THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE COUNTY OF MARION, OREGON In the Matter of Requesting The Board of Commissioners of Marion County and the Governor of the RESOLUTION State of Oregon to Declare the Cities of Detroit & Idanha An Emergency/Disaster Area. WHEREAS, on this 11th Day of January, 2017, a snow/ice emergency has occurred and (incident/date/time of occurrence) has affected the Cities of Detroit and Idanha, specifically: entire city limits (specify N, E, W, S boundaries of impacted area, entire city limits) WHEREAS, this emergency/disaster was caused by a series of winter storms beginning in December of (describe cause of incident more specifically) WHEREAS, the following conditions exist in the impacted area: snow and ice are blocking roads restricting emergency access to residences; snow blocking access to Idanha water system; · snow berms piled on water meters preventing access to find excessive water leaks; · berms are blocking hydrants throughout both cities; · heavy snow loads on roofs are endangering structures; citizens with functional and access needs are unable to leave residences for necessary medical care; large snow berms are hindering movement throughout both cities WHEREAS, there have been zero fatalities and zero injuries, and residents of the Cities of Detroit and are at risk of emergency service unable to respond to fire or medical emergencies; citizens of Idanha at risk of water system failure; citizens unable to go to work or medical appointments; both communities at high risk for structural damage because of this emergency. Initial estimates of costs and losses total \$ unknown as summarized on the attached Initial Damage Assessment report form. (This paragraph is optional depending upon needs and type of emergency.) WHEREAS, the City Resolution No. 489, serves as a basis for an emergency declaration and shall be an exercise of police power and emergency control in the public's interest. WHEREAS, the Cities of Detroit and Idanha have declared the area described in the first paragraph above, to be in a "State of Emergency" on the 11th day of January, 2017_____ at 1:30 _____ o'clock WHEREAS, the Cities of Detroit and Idanha have expended all its own resources and resources of its mutual aid/cooperative assistance agencies in response to the emergency and further response to the emergency is beyond the Cities of Detroit & Idanha's capability.

Streets needing plowed: 2

Tree limb on roof of structure: 1

Subject: Snow Emergency Incident Closeout

The Idanha-Detroit Fire District initiated and coordinated the emergency response and co-management of the snow emergency experienced in both cities. We could not have not have successfully accomplished this without the guidance and assistance from Marion County Emergency Management plus the support of over 70 people from Marion County Sheriff's Office, Marion County Public Works, Linn County Sheriff's Office, the Cities of Idanha and Detroit, members of the Idanha-Detroit Fire District, and many other volunteers.

Per the emergency plans, once both mayors declared a "State of Emergency" on January 11, 2017 at 1:30 PM, the Fire Chief assumed command of the incident which was instantly delegated to Assistant Chief Jack Krill. He established a Unified Command with Marion County Emergency Manager Ed Flick and Marion County Sheriff's Office Sargent Shane Burnham.

The primary objectives of the emergency incident have been met. Therefore we are declaring the overall "State of Emergency" concluded and terminating the emergency incident as of 3:00 PM on January 13, 2017. This means that each city is now coordinating their ongoing efforts.

Emergency vehicle access has been improved in both cities; most roads to occupied structures are currently passable for emergency vehicles and all fire hydrants are accessible again. We strongly encourage each city to keep improving and maintaining hydrant clearance and roadway access for emergency vehicles. This needs to be a continued and ongoing effort. Both cities also need to consider putting immediate plans in place for additional snow and ice accumulation, potential melting, and potential flooding in the days and weeks ahead in order to prevent future emergency conditions.

Access to the Idanha water supply and reservoir was successfully accomplished and resources are on scene and/or responding through the ORWARN system to assist the City of Idanha with water system distribution issues. With regards to other utilities, CPI and Frontier were notified of potential heavy snow, ice, and trees on their overhead lines that could potentially compromise power and communications in the area.

Marion County Emergency Management will be planning an After Action Review in the near future; we look forward to participating in that with all of you. The Idanha-Detroit Fire District truly appreciates the good working relationship with each city and we are here to help when called upon.
