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SECTION I: BACKGROUND

he Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) periodically conducts a survey to assess the characteristics and needs of inmates held in the work release center and the jail. Most recently, surveys were conducted in 2005, 2007, and 2011. The MCSO contracted with NPC Research (NPC) in May 2015 to conduct the latest survey.

Survey Information

While the current report makes comparisons to previous survey iterations where possible, there are several factors to keep in mind when making comparisons of survey items over time, including survey content, method of administration, timing of administration, and methods of cleaning and analyses. Each is briefly discussed below.

SURVEY ITEMS

While efforts were made to retain core survey items (e.g., demographics, criminal history) across administrations, some modules were added or edited over time to cover key areas of interest, such as veterans, parenting, gang activity, and methamphetamine use. Due to the short time between contract finalization and administration, NPC focused on reformatting and editing the existing survey and did not add a topical module.

SURVEY MODE

Previously the survey items used check boxes to record answers; the questions were completed by the inmates and then entered into a database by staff. NPC opted to use a Teleform survey administration. The survey was reformatted to require inmates to fill in answer bubbles for each question, which were then scanned by a machine into a database. Teleform was used to save time and money, and apply consistent decision rules when interpreting answers (such as how to code multiple answers for a single-answer item). In adopting this approach, several open-ended items involving free text had to be converted to limited answer options. Answer distributions from the previous survey were used to inform answer options. For example, instead of asking what medical problem(s) a person has, inmates were asked to select from a list of the most prevalent medical issues, with "other" being a catch-all for less common ailments.

METHOD OF ADMINISTRATION

Since NPC did not conduct the previous administrations, we cannot be sure we followed the same protocols used previously. The administration approach between the work release center and the jail (and then from unit to unit within the jail) also varied in the 2015 administration. In the work release units, the purpose of the survey was announced in the dayroom area and residents were asked to complete the survey there. In the general population areas of the jail, blocks of cells were opened so NPC staff could announce the



purpose of the survey and request participation. In some instances, inmates filed out, obtained the survey from NPC staff, returned to their cell for completion, and NPC staff collected completely surveys either all at once or as they were completed; in others, NPC staff passed out surveys door to door and then returned to collect them. In the administrative segregation area, NPC staff went door to door to explain the purpose of the survey and request participation. NPC staff also conducted one-to-one interviews when requested.

TIMING OF ADMINISTRATION

The previous survey was conducted in December 2011; the current survey was conducted on a Friday and Saturday in June 2015. The work release center has a capacity of 144 residents and had 114 listed on the roster on the first day of administration. The jail has a capacity of 400 inmates (excluding about 15 intake beds) and had 361 listed on the roster on the first day of administration. (We did not update the rosters on the second day of administration to simplify tracking and because new arrivals are less likely to want to participate in a survey.)

Jail populations can vary by season (Bennett & Lattin, 2009), and characteristics of the population may vary accordingly. It is noted in the report when differences between survey findings may be attributable, at least in part, to seasonal population differences.

RESPONSE RATE

As noted above, the populations in both facilities were low at the time of administration—the work release center was at 79% capacity and the jail at 90%. The survey response rate is detailed in Table 1 below. The response rate in the work release center was 62% and the rate in the jail was 77%, for an overall response rate of about 74%. Many in the work release center had left for work or left during administration. There were also various challenges in the jail, including inmate movements (on work detail or out to court), newly arrived inmates still under the influence of drugs or alcohol, and other statuses or activities that impacted the response rate (i.e., administrative segregation, watching a movie in the dayroom). We have no reason to believe there is any bias in the sample of inmates completing the survey.

DATA CLEANING AND ANALYSES

There were several questions in which respondents were asked to select one answer and instead selected several. Where possible, these items were re-coded to allow for multiple responses. Some of these items will not be directly comparable to previous years as a result (since they will sum to more than 100%). For survey items that required a single answer, the more conservative answer was selected. For example, if a respondent marked that they have been Oregon residents for "1-5 years" and "more than 20 years," the "1-5 years" option was selected. Documentation on decisions made for each question is available upon request. In instances where a respondent marked "yes" and "no" to a single question, the reviewer looked for context (did they go on to answer follow-up questions indicating that "yes" was the correct answer). If the intended answer was not clear, the answer option was left blank. This documentation was not available from previous surveys, so NPC may have made different judgments than the last contractor; however, we do not believe these instances to be sufficiently frequent to result in significantly different outcomes in the aggregate.

Analyses in most cases were straightforward. For questions that applied to everyone, the denominator used to calculate percentages was everyone who answered the question (see the "valid percent" column in the frequencies in the Appendix A); for follow-up questions, the denominator was the subset of people who answered the base question (those who didn't answer were filtered out of the calculation, and then the "valid percent" column was again used). For example, if a respondent said "no" to having children, they were then taken out of the denominator to calculate the percentages for the subsequent questions about children. *When the denominator has been filtered, the sub-headings are indented in the tables. This is important to note so that findings are not misinterpreted. For example, see Table 12 where time in Oregon is reported only for those who said they were Oregon residents.*

Crosstabulations by sex were also requested and are available in a separate PDF document due to length.

In most instances, findings were consistent with previous ones, indicating that a similar analyses approach was used. Cases where data are not comparable are noted and/or previous findings are not presented in tables. Differences in item responses to those in previous years are based on percentages and were not subjected to testing for statistical significance due to time and budget limitations.

SECTION II: FINDINGS

urvey findings were compared to previous years whenever possible. NPC used reports and PowerPoint presentations as sources for previous findings. As noted in the previous section, there were times that data were not comparable due to a change to the question or differences in analytic approach. These differences are noted in the sections below. Findings are also sometimes compared to national jail population statistics to offer context for how MCSO is both similar to and different from jail populations in the nation.

The number of respondents (n) varied for each survey and for items within each survey (due to skip patterns, non-response, or unclear responses). The table below shows the total number of respondents for each survey year. To simplify tables, n's for each cell were not included in the report tables, but are available in the frequency tables in Appendix A. The survey is available in Appendix B.

Demographics

Demographics describe the general characteristics of the population and include the following variables collected in the survey: sex, age, race, marital status, education, citizenship, residency and homelessness, and employment.



SEX

About one in six inmates (17%) in MCSO was female in 2015, slightly higher than the percent of females in the 2011 population (14%) and slightly lower than the 2007 and 2005 populations (20% and 19%, respectively). This percent is also slightly higher than the average found in the nation's jails, according to the Annual Survey of Jails, 2014 (Minton & Zeng, 2015), the most recent available data. The MCSO female population was between 3 percentage points (in 2015) and just over 6 percentage points (in 2005) higher than the national average. Female inmates often have backgrounds involving trauma (see the domestic violence and abuse findings later in the report) and have different needs than male inmates in trying to break the incarceration cycle.

AGE

Age was tabulated using dates of birth based on the roster documentation of who completed the surveys (thus, this is the only variable based on administrative data rather than selfreport). The 0.9% for inmates ages 15-18 in 2015 represents three inmates, all age 18. The mean age in 2015 was 34.4 years (mean age for previous years is not readily available).

As with the rest of the nation, the jail inmate population at MCSO is gradually aging: the 15-26 and 27-38 categories made up a smaller portion of the population in 2015 compared to 2005, and the 39-50 and 50+ categories made up a larger portion. The 50+ category has tripled since 2005 (from about 3% to 9%). While much of the focus on the aging inmate population is on prisons, older inmates may bring a plethora of medical issues with them that can be challenging for jails to address (see section on medical problems later in the report).

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RACE

The MCSO jail population is largely White and Hispanic/Latino (52% and 21% in 2015, respectively). Please note that Hispanic/Latino is categorized with race due to shifting social definitions of race and ethnicity – i.e., Hispanic/Latino individuals often do not self-identify as both Hispanic/Latino and White (as was the convention in the past).

According to estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau, Marion County is about two-thirds White (non-Hispanic Whites). While Whites are the largest group in the jail (52%) in 2015, other racial groups are overrepresented, particularly African Americans and "two or more races." For the latter, this may be due to individuals increasingly likely to identify more than one race/ethnicity, particularly when given this option in self-report surveys. Previous surveys had a mixed race category with a "please specify" and the 2015 survey had a "mark all that apply" option and "other" category. The table below shows a slight increase in "other" from 2005 to 2011 – for these years "other" represents "mixed race" while in 2015, the "other" category represents "other race." The two or more category shows that almost 13% percent of inmates in 2015 identified as mixed race when given the opportunity to select multiple answers.

MARITAL STATUS

Marital status is another demographic measure that varies over time. Most inmates consistently identify as "single." In 2007 and 2011, respondents were given the option to select partner/living together; however, this category can introduce confusion for those who are legally single but have a significant other with whom they may or may not reside, so this option was removed in 2015. The proportion of inmates who were married peaked in 2007 at 28% and fell to 17% in 2015, the lowest marriage rate recorded in the decade.

EDUCATION

The inmate population in 2015 has more education compared to the 2007 population. A smaller proportion had 8 years or less of completed education years and about one-third of inmates (32%) had at least 1 year of college in 2015 compared to 8% in 2007 (data for 2005 were not available).

Another third of inmates in 2015 were high school graduates, slightly higher than in prior survey years. Inmates were more likely to have a high school degree or GED in 2015 compared to 2005 (71% and 55%, respectively).

Nearly half of respondents in 2015 reported receiving their GED from a community college. The fact that one-third of respondents in 2015 reported receiving a GED while incarcerated (up from 20% in 2007) indicates that these programs in jail and prison facilities are being utilized.

CITIZENSHIP AND LANGUAGE

About 8% of inmates in 2015 reported they were not U.S. citizens. (Nearly 8% of respondents—26 people—did not answer this question in 2015; additional analyses were done to determine the race/ethnicity of those opting out of this question, and all were White but one.) The non-citizen population for the decade peaked in 2005 at 13%.

Most inmates reported their primary language was English (86% in 2015). Most inmates said they could speak English (97%), and four in 10 (41%) could speak Spanish, the highest percentages over the decade.

RESIDENT STATUS AND HOMELESSNESS

Over 90% of inmates over time reported being Oregon residents, most have been in Oregon more than 10 years, eight in 10 were Marion County residents, and most are from Salem. These findings were consistent over the last three surveys, although a higher percentage said they have been Oregon residents more than 20 years in 2015 (62%) compared to previous years.

About two-thirds of respondents across survey years reported having a permanent place to live prior to their most recent arrest. About half of inmates in 2011 and 2015 said they have a permanent place to go after release, compared to just over one-third in 2007.

About 46% of inmates in 2015 said they had ever been denied housing due to their criminal record compared to 63% in 2011. Research has shown that federal and local public housing authorities have a "one strike and you're out" policy for certain offenses, barring those with a single conviction from public housing or housing assistance (Vallas and Dietrich, 2014). Private housing entities may also deny housing based on criminal record and/or a failure to meet income requirements, which can compound reentry challenges since employment can be difficult to obtain with a criminal record.

The prevalence of homelessness was similar across surveys. About seven in 10 inmates in 2015 reported ever being homeless and about half (53%) of these people were homeless just before their arrest. (*Note: 62% reported a permanent residence – it may be that some respondents were staying with friends or family at a permanent residence, but still considered themselves functionally homeless. Similar discrepancies are found across surveys years.*) About 75.3% who reported in 2015 being homeless at some point said they were homeless more than once and 42% reported at least once homeless period that lasted more than 1 year. Unemployment and substance abuse were the most common reasons listed for homelessness.

EMPLOYMENT

Employment challenges for those with a criminal record have been well-documented, most recently by Vallas & Dietrich, 2014, and have inspired policy discussions such as criminal record "redemption" (capping the time for which a criminal record remains active, see Blumstein & Nakamura, 2009).

About half of respondents (49%) in 2015 reported having a job prior to arrest. Nearly one-third (31%) expected to have a job upon release, a higher percent than in previous survey years. Nearly one in six (58%) reported said they had been denied a job due to a criminal record.



Monthly income prior to arrest varied across respondents and compared to previous survey years. One notable difference is that nearly 12% of respondents reported a monthly income of over \$3,000 in 2015. Just over one-quarter (26.7%) of inmates reported a monthly income over \$2,000 in 2015, compared to 11% of inmates in 2005. Still, a larger percentage of inmates in both years reported \$1,000 or less (36% in 2015 and 38% in 2005).

Criminal History

Many individuals in jail have previous experience with the criminal justice system. This section briefly describes the extent of that experience.





JUVENILE CRIMINAL HISTORY

About half of respondents (51%) in 2015 had been arrested as a juvenile, and most were under the age 15 at the time of their first arrest (59%). Over three-quarters of inmates arrested as a juvenile inmates had been under juvenile supervision or in juvenile detention, lower than the 95% in 2007. About 30% of this group spent time with the Oregon Youth Authority (OYA), twice the 2007 rate (15%).

ADULT CRIMINAL HISTORY AND CURRENT STATUS

Over half of the jail population in 2015 (54%) was awaiting a court appearance, slightly higher than the 48% in 2011, but lower than the national average of 63% in 2014 (Minton & Zeng, 2015).

The offense charges between the survey iterations differed fairly substantially. The 2015 survey was administered in early June, the 2011 survey in December, and the 2007 survey in July. According to the National Crime Victimization survey, there are differences in overall offending and in offense type by season (Lauritsen & White, 2014). For example, rates of household burglaries, aggravated assault, rape/sexual assault, and intimate partner violence are statistically higher in summer months compared to winter months. However, these trends offer no real clarity to the differences in distributions between the surveys in MCSO facilities.

The persons in jail awaiting court on misdemeanor person and misdemeanor property charges were highest in 2015 (22% and 11%, respectively) compared to prior surveys. Felony person charges fell from the 2011 survey to 28% in 2015, and felony property charges were the lowest in 2015 among the three survey periods at 18%. Drug charges were consistent with the 2007 report (15%), but lower than 2011, and probation/parole violations were less than half the 2011 percentage (14% versus 36%). DUIs also declined slightly from 5% to 4%. The decline in both drug charges and probation parole charges from 2011 could be an actual decline in activity or be reflective of law enforcement priorities.

The proportion of MCSO inmates serving a sentence is higher in 2015, particularly when compared to 2007 (55% compared to 49%), as is the percentage of those convicted of a misdemeanor person offense (21% compared to 10%) and drug offenses (23% compared to 1%). Probation/parole violation convictions reached a high of 39% in 2015, possibly reflecting a



policy change in supervision. Distributions of sentence length have shifted slightly, mostly on the low and high ends—about a quarter of 2015 inmates are serving a sentence of 30 days, compared to 15% in 2011; 20% are serving more than 180 days compared to 13% doing so in 2011. Conviction charges and sentence length are both subject to many influences, including law enforcement priorities, plea bargaining practices, ballot measures (Measure 57), and judicial approaches.

About 44% of respondents in 2015 (both unconvicted and convicted) had served 30 days or less at the time of the survey, compared to 52% in 2011 and 76% in 2007. This turnover is a key challenge jails face in providing programming and services, since many inmates are not incarcerated long enough for sustained programming or assistance. Still, the proportion of inmates with more than 90 days in jail increased from 21% in 2011 to 26% in 2015 (the data were not available for 2007), so there is sufficient time for lengthier programming and service opportunities for part of the population should such services be appropriate during incarceration.

Only 13% of inmates reported the current stay in 2015 to be their first time in jail, compared to 17% in 2011, and 42% nationally (James, 2004). About 38% in 2015 reported 10 or more incarcerations, up from 27% in 2011 and 14% in 2007. About 14% also reported being in jail more than 5 times in the last year, up from 2% in 2011 and 1% in 2007.

About half of respondents said they were currently on probation (48%), up about 10 percentage points from 2011 and 2007. Inmates reported whether they had ever had a probation revocation at similar rates in 2015 and 2011, but there was a shift in the reasons—technical violations declined from 2011 and new offenses increased. About one-third of jail inmates in 2015 said they were on parole, up from 13% in 2011, with revocation rates and reasons similar over both survey periods, although parole violations for technical offenses were down in 2015 to 39%, from 61% in 2007.

About one-third of jail inmates (36%) in 2015 reported serving prior prison time, consistent with the 2011 survey and slightly lower than the 2007 survey (40%). Just under half of those inmates (44%) in 2015 reported one prison stay, lower than the 66% reported in 2007. About one in five in 2015 said they had been to prison more than 3 times. One-fifth (21%) served a total of less than 2 years (up from 8% in 2011 and 17% in 2007). The largest share (60%) served from 2 to just under 10 years (80% in 2011), and 19% of the 2015 respondents served more than 10 years (up from 13% in 2011).

In 2015, former prisoners were more likely to report a felony person offense (54%) compared to 2011 (47%) and 2007 (20%). Felony property crime offenses dropped from 68% in 2007 to 33% in 2015. Of those who served time in prison, many said they participated in programming there: about one-third of 2015 jail inmates participated in résumé building, job search assistance, and parenting classes; about four in 10 participated in anger management, substance abuse programming, and GED classes.

FAMILY CRIMINAL HISTORY

The cycle of incarceration is not limited to individuals who are repeatedly involved in the criminal justice system, but also refers to criminal involvement that spans generations. About 40% of respondents to the 2015 survey had a father who was in jail at least once and 20% reported their father had spent time in prison; mothers were about half that rate—22% had a mother with jail time and 8% with prison time. More than half (58%) of respondents reported other members of their immediate family had spent some time incarcerated.

Social Services

Data on the social services questions are not directly comparable to previous years. Prior surveys asked about social services requested or received by either the respondent or their families and it was unclear if the respondent was to answer for their household, immediate family, or extended family. For this reason, the questions were revised to specifically ask if the respondent had applied for or received certain services. Services are ranked by the percent of inmates who said they applied.

Most prevalent was the application for and receipt of food stamps—85% applied for, and 95% of applicants received, food stamps. The next most common service was the Oregon Health Plan. Just over one-third of respondents said they applied for housing assistance (not surprising, given that 38% reported they did not have a permanent residence at the time of arrest), and 39% received it. (This category was the lowest success rate among service applications and may be due to regulations among providers that either limit housing assistance to non-felons or prioritize those without a criminal history.)

Over one-third (35%) of inmates applied at some point for substance abuse treatment, and four out of five (82%) received it. Over one-quarter of inmates applied for cash assistance and mental health services (29% and 27%, respectively), and the majority received these services (71% and 74%, respectively).

Disabilities, Medical Problems, and Mental Health Issues

Disabilities, medical problems, and mental health issues are all covered in this section. The percentage of inmates reporting these problems is higher than in the past—it is unclear if the prevalence of the problems is actually higher (which may be the case with medical issues among older inmates) or whether individuals are more likely to be forthcoming about these challenges disabilities and mental health issues) in recent years compared to the past (.

DISABILITIES

Four in 10 inmates reported a disability of some type, up from 28% in 2011 and 27% in 2007. Psychological disabilities were the most common (64% in 2015 compared to 11% in 2007), followed by medical (50% in 2015) and "other" (29% in 2015). Approximately 60% of respondents with a disability said they applied for disability benefits (down from 77% in 2011), and about half (48%) received benefits (down from 56% in 2011). About 82% of inmates with a disability reported that this disability interferes with their ability to find employment, down slightly from 87% in 2011.

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MEDICAL ISSUES

Nearly half (47%) of jail inmates in 2015 said they had some kind of medical problem, up more than 10% from 2011 and 2007 and higher than the 37% national rate among jail inmates found in 2002 (Maruschak, 2002). About 61% reported they had medical insurance or coverage, up from 14% in 2011 and 11% in 2007, likely attributable in part to the Affordable Care Act. More inmates reported being tested for AIDS/HIV and Hepatitis C in 2015 than in prior years, and 85% said they had been tested for tuberculosis (TB, not asked in previous surveys). About 11% of inmates who reported being tested for Hepatitis C and TB reported receiving treatment. (Note: Respondents were not asked if they ever tested positive for AIDS/HIV, Hepatitis C, or TB.)

The prevalence of specific medical problems is compared to findings from the Survey of Inmates of Local Jails in 2002 (Maruschak, 2006). It should be noted that the national jail population has likely aged since the 2002 survey (as has MCSO's population) and since medical issues are more prevalent among older people these comparisons are likely not directly comparable—still, this is the best information available at the time of the report.

Among the 47% of inmates reporting a medical problem, one quarter reported asthma and about one-fifth reported hepatitis and arthritis. About 11% of inmates reported hypertension, another 11% reported a different heart-related condition, and 10% had liver-related problems.

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MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES

Over half of jail inmates (51%) in 2015 reported receiving a mental health diagnosis, up from 28% in 2011 and 18% in 2007. About 48% of all respondents in 2015 reported receiving mental health services (also up substantially from prior surveys), and 25% reported being hospitalized for a psychiatric condition.

Of those who said in 2015 that they received a diagnosis, the most common disorder was depression (34%) followed by anxiety (31%), post-traumatic stress (25%), and bipolar (20%). Notably, 77% of those reporting a diagnosis selected two or more options. Of those with a diagnosis, 80% said they received medication (compared to 26% in 2011); 38% were taking medication at the time of arrest and, of these, nearly half (46%) said they were able to continue their medications after arrest.

About 56% of inmates said they have a current mental health problem (higher than the 51% with a diagnosis), about twice the rate reported in 2011. While this percent may seem high, it is consistent with findings in the 2002 jail survey, in which 64% of inmates in local jails either reported a history of any mental health condition or symptoms consistent with a current mental health condition (James & Glaze, 2006). Medical and mental health professionals have also worked very hard in recent years to reduce the social stigma associated with mental

health problems; part of the increase seen here could reflect a greater willingness to report these issues.

Of the 56% of inmates reporting a current mental health issue, depression (37%), anxiety (35%), post traumatic stress (28%), and bipolar (19%) disorders were again the most commonly reported. Of those inmates reporting an issue, 84% selected more than one option. Over one-fourth (28%) of all respondents said they would have access to mental health treatment after release in 2015 and 26% said they did not need treatment (despite the fact that 56% reported a current mental health problem).

Alcohol and Drugs

Substance abuse and dependence is an issue that is common among those involved in the criminal justice system. Based on the most recent national jail survey, 47% of inmates reported symptoms in the year before their admission to jail consistent with alcohol dependence or abuse and 53% reported similar symptoms consistent with drug dependence or abuse (Karberg & James, 2005). Alcohol and drug use is also a factor in the commission of some crimes— among convicted jail inmates, 49% of those meeting dependence or abuse criteria reported using alcohol at the time of offense and 55% reported using drugs (Karberg & James, 2005). Of those inmates meeting dependence or abuse criteria, 63% reported participating in some type substance treatment program, including self-help groups and counseling, and 47% percent participated while under correctional supervision (including jail, prison, and community supervision) (Karberg & James, 2005).

ALCOHOL

In 2015, a lower percentage of inmates reported ever having a problem with alcohol—42% (compared to 63% in 2011 and 53% in 2007). Notably, 42% also reported attending treatment in the 2015 survey (though nearly one-third of these inmates said they never had a problem, not shown in the table), with 84% saying they successfully completed treatment. Only 13% reported a current problem with alcohol, down from 24% in 2011 and 82% in 2007. About 42% of respondents said their parents or guardians had an alcohol problem when they were growing up.

DRUGS

About half (51%) of inmates in the 2015 survey reported ever having a drug problem; 52% of inmates reported attending a treatment program with 77% successfully completing treatment. Despite having a successful treatment episode, 38% reported they currently have a drug problem and 37% reported detoxing in jail (though not necessarily in the current stay).

Nearly one-fifth (19%) of inmates reported a problem with prescription drugs, up from 12% in 2007. Seven in 10 inmates in 2015 reported using methamphetamines; 31% reported using heroin and, of these, 47% indicated they had a problem with heroin.

Military Service

Approximately 9% of inmates reported serving in the military in 2015, mostly the Army (62%), Navy (31%), and Marines (7%). Length of service varied widely—about 28% served 3 years or less and 35% served 5 years or more. (Data on service length were not comparable to previous years due to different time categories). About four in five (82%) received an honorable discharge. Just over half (55%) of the veterans applied for benefits, and 56% received them. While a lower percentage of veterans applied for benefits in 2011 (35%), the rate of those receiving them was substantially higher (94%).

In 2015, about one-third of veterans (35%) reported being deployed to a combat area; about half of those in 2011 (71%). Among inmates who saw combat, most (70%) expressed difficulties in coping with their memories and indicated they needed help.

Family Situation and Social Ties

This section briefly describes respondent childhood backgrounds and gang affiliation, as well as number of children, custody status, and information on where the children reside.

CHILDHOOD

The survey asked some brief background questions on respondent childhoods. Of the 77% of respondents whose parents were once married, 45% had divorced parents at the time of the survey. Nearly four in 10 had parents who divorced when they were under 5 years old and another third (35%) had parents who were divorced when the respondent was between ages 6 and 12.

Just over one-quarter (27%) had lived in a foster home at some point, slightly higher than results found in prior surveys. Length of time in foster care was less than 6 months for 25% and less than 1 year for about half (51%); just over one-quarter (26%) spent more than 3 years in foster care. Of those inmates ever in foster care, 47% rated the experience as bad or very bad, lower than in previous survey years.

Drawing on questions from the abuse and violence section of the survey, about one-third (34%) of respondents in 2015 reported being physically abused as a child.

CHILDREN

Most of the literature on incarcerated parents is focused on individuals in prison, since time spent in prison is on average lengthier than that spent in jail (thus having a greater impact on financial and emotional support available for children), and prisons are often located further away from the last place of residence, which can make visitation challenging. Incarceration of a parent in jail, however, can substantially disrupt a child's life, particularly if they were living with that parent prior to arrest. Please note these data are not comparable to previous surveys since the 2015 survey did not limit responses to biological children (due to concerns over omitting other children who might live in the household, such as adopted children, children of a spouse/partner, etc.).

More than two-thirds (68%) of jail inmates said they were parents in 2015, more than in 2011 (58%). About 67% of men and 73% of women were parents (see tables in appendices). Among the 219 incarcerated parents reporting number of children (two parents did not report this



information), there were an estimated 594 children, an average of 2.7 children each (not shown in table). Approximately two-thirds (68%) of children were under 18. Less than half of parents (46%) said they lived with one or more children at the time of their arrest (accounting for about 31% of all reported children, including those over 18). Most inmates said their children were currently living with a spouse/partner (50%) and respondents indicated numerous other sources of support in raising their children, including grandparents (29%) and other relatives (30%).

GANG MEMBERSHIP

Less than one-quarter (23%) of inmates reported gang involvement, slightly higher than in previous survey years (20% in 2011 and 18% in 2007). Among those respondents who said they had ever been involved in a gang, most were White (32%), Hispanic/Latino (30%), or two or more races (19%).

Domestic Violence and Other Physical and Sexual Abuse

The survey asked inmates about experiences with domestic violence, including being controlled, and verbally, physically, and sexually abused by a current or former partner. Results were compared to a national survey from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (Black et al., 2011) on recent and lifetime prevalence of abuse in the general population (see bolded text in table). While results may not be directly comparable due to different instrumentation, they offer context as to prevalence of rates of abuse in jail compared to the general population.

There are three main themes to note. First, rates of controlling behaviors and verbal, physical, and sexual abuse by current and former partners were high on many measures for both males and females. Second, rates were systematically higher for females compared to males across current and past partners (for example, the rate of females reporting forcible sexual activity by a recent partner was nearly 7 times the male rate). Third, rates of physical and sexual violence were substantially higher among the incarcerated population than in the general public, with the exception of lifetime sexual abuse rates for males. For example, the rate of recent physical abuse by an intimate partner for men in jail was nearly 7 times higher than males in the general population; for females in jail, the rate was over 13 times higher than females in the general population.



While substantial attention is given to the needs of female victims during incarceration, it is clear that males also have potential needs regarding abuse, trauma, and victimization.

Programming and Service Needs

Inmates were asked about the reasons for their current incarceration, how they could reduce the likelihood of returning to jail, and what services for themselves and their families they deemed most important in the short term.

REASONS FOR INCARCERATION

When asked what the primary reason for their current incarceration was, most respondents (38%) selected the "bad choices" option. About 24% selected drug use, followed by probation violation (12%), homelessness (11%), and alcohol use (10%). Interestingly, although 49% were unemployed at the time of arrest, only 7% attributed their current incarceration to unemployment.

REDUCING RECIDIVISM AND REENTRY NEEDS

Jail inmates were also asked for ways they could stay out of jail (they could mark multiple responses). Most respondents said they needed to find a job (41%). The next most popular category was the response that they would not return to jail (39%); it is notable that of these inmates, 42% also reported they had been in jail at least twice in the last year. Other common answers were to stop using drugs (35%), though only 28% thought substance abuse treatment would be helpful. Also noteworthy is that 26% claimed they needed better access to mental health services, though a third as many (9%) attributed their current stay to a lack of mental health services.

Respondents were also asked to rank the three most important services that would help them and their families in the short term. Unfortunately, the survey question was unclear and few inmates answered the question as intended—many instead used the same number(s) multiple times (marking several options as 1, "the most important") or ranked all the answers. For this reason, the data in Table 43 below represent the percent of inmates who selected the answer option at all and should be interpreted with great caution (rather than a ranked list of desired services, it is more representative of a mass wish list). Three-quarters (75%) said they needed assistance finding a job, followed by housing assistance (70%) and food (53%). Half (50%) said they needed substance abuse treatment (though only 28% said they thought they needed such treatment to stay out of jail).

Summary

The MCSO jail and work release center has a population with characteristics that are typical of jail populations across the nation. The individuals face challenges with housing, employment, substance abuse, medical and mental health needs, and physical and sexual abuse histories that are generally greater than that seen in the general population. Jails have a small window of time to address these issues and cannot practically provide all the services needed. While reentry program often focus on the transition from prison to the community, there are some that are jail- specific. Initiatives to improve services both within the jail and following release are underway in programs such as the Transition from Jail to Community (TJC) sponsored by National Institute of Corrections (see here for more information about this and other reentry programs: http://nicic.gov/jailtransition. Another initiative underway is for jails to gain access to county and state-level medical and mental health records to streamline the assessment process and minimize the period in which incoming inmates go without necessary medications (Butler, 2014). Both training and services have made great advances within corrections in recent decades, and research on evidence-based practices will continue to evolve the assessment, care, and services provided to inmates.

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APPENDIX A: SURVEY ITEM FREQUENCIES

Following are frequency distributions for all survey items. For some distributions, results were filtered to those inmates who answered "yes" to an earlier question (this distinction can be most easily detected by looking at the sample sizes [n's]). The number of missing responses for each question is listed, as well as "percent," to see what percent of respondents did not answer specific questions. The report uses "valid percent" columns from the distributions below, which exclude missing responses. Cumulative percents are also listed in the event one wants to use answer option cutpoints to view the data. For example, that 90.8% of inmates were 50 or younger.
