

A Message from the Clerk . . .

Dear Marion County Voters,

You may notice a new look to your ballot. We've updated the vote tally system, increasing security, mark recognition sensitivity and operational efficiency. Please review the new voting directions in this voter pamphlet and on your ballot.

This Oregon Primary Election has two purposes. All voters decide on candidates for nonpartisan offices, and on local, county and state measures. Voters registered as Republican or Democrat select candidates to represent that party in the November General Election.

Contact us if you have not received your mailed ballot by Friday, May 4th.

Please note that we have moved the curbside ballot drop site to the Marion County Courthouse for improved safety, security and wider voter convenience. The election office is still open for walk-in service.

You may now register to vote or update your voter registration on-line at <u>www.oregonvotes.org</u>. For new Oregon voters, April 24th is the last day to complete registration (and obtain postmark if mailed) for the May 15th Primary Election. This is also the last day for currently registered voters to change party affiliation.

If your residential or mailing address has changed, please update your registration with us now, Voter registration forms are available at the elections office, most libraries, city halls and post offices, and our web site, <u>http://www.co.marion.or.us/CO/elections/</u>.

This voter pamphlet is available in downloadable audio on our web site, <u>http://www.co.marion.</u> <u>or.us/CO/elections/</u>. Independent Living Resources, 503-232-7411, will mail a voter pamphlet on CD or tape on request. We offer assistive technology for people with ballot access barriers such as blindness, vision or movement limitations. We have a computer-assisted voting station in the Election office and by appointment with advance notice at the Clerk's Licensing and Recording office at 1115 Commercial St NE, Salem. Please bring your ballot envelope. Call our office for additional options, including large print ballots, e-mail deliverable Alternate Format Ballots, or tactile ballots for aid in voting privately and independently. We will problem solve with you to assure any registered voter who wishes to vote does vote.

## **Instructions For Voting Your Ballot**

## **Review The Ballot Packet:**

It should contain at least the following items:


- Printed ballot
- A pre-addressed Return envelope
- Secrecy envelope
- Informational Insert

If any items are missing, contact Marion County Elections.

## **Important Ballot Information:**

If a ballot has been delivered to your address and it is addressed to <u>someone who does not live at your</u> <u>address</u>:

- 1. Mark through the address like this:
- 2. Return to your mailbox, post office or letter carrier.



## Notify Marion County Elections <u>Before</u> Voting The Ballot Delivered To You If:

- Your name is different than that on the label; or
- Your residence address has changed; or
- You have added, deleted or changed a mailing address.

## To make sure your vote counts:

- Use a **black or blue ballpoint ink pen**. <u>DO NOT</u> use a felt tip pen to mark your ballot.
- Completely fill in the box to the left of your choice.
- To vote on a measure, complete the box next to either the "YES" or "NO",

## Voting a Write-In

• To vote for a candidate whose name does not appear on the ballot, write the person's name on the line provided for that office heading labeled "Write In". Then complete the box next to the write-in line.



• It is very important that you complete the box next to the name you wrote on the line. You must complete both the box and the name in order for your vote to be counted!

# CHECK YOUR BALLOT

- Make sure you have completely filled in the box(s) next to your choice(s).
- If you vote **both** "Yes" and "No" on a measure or vote for more candidates than allowed, it is called an overvote. Your vote will not count for that measure or candidate(s).
- You do not have to vote on all contests. Those you do vote will still count.
- Make no extra marks on your ballot(s), except where directed. DO NOT write in margins.
- To change a Vote: Draw a line through the INCORRECT name like this: John Doe and then complete the box next to the correct candidate or YES/NO choice.
- You may obtain a replacement ballot by contacting the Elections Office at 503.588.5041 or 1.800.655.5388.

## **Returning Your Voted Ballot**

- Place the ballot in the secrecy envelope, seal it, then place the secrecy envelope in the Return envelope. Do not remove the label.
- Sign the Voter Statement on the back of the Return envelope. Your ballot will not be counted if <u>you</u> do not sign <u>your</u> envelope.
- To return your ballot by mail, place one first class stamp on the envelope.
- To return your ballot other than through the mail, please refer to the list of <u>ballot drop sites</u>. You may return your ballot to any Official Ballot Drop Site in the State.



## For Your Ballot To Be Counted:

- Mark your ballot according to voting instructions.
- Do **<u>NOT</u>** remove any label(s).
- Your Return ballot envelope must be signed.
- To return your ballot by mail, place one first class stamp on the Return envelope.
- Your ballot must be received in the Elections Office or an Official Ballot Drop Site by 8:00 P.M. on Election Day.

# What If I ...?

### What if I make a mistake on my ballot?

If you make a mistake, draw a line through the entire measure response or candidate's name. You then can make another choice if desired.

# What if I change my mind after I turn in my ballot?

Your ballot has been cast as soon as you deposit it in the mail or at a ballot drop site. After that, you cannot receive a new ballot.

# What if I don't vote on everything on the ballot?

Your ballot will be counted.

What if I don't sign my return envelope? You will be notified by mail that your ballot was recieved unsigned.

## What if I don't receive my ballot?

If you are a registered voter and don't receive your ballot within five days after they are mailed out, call us at Marion County Elections Office at 503-588-5041, 1-800-655-5388, TTY/TDD 503-588-5610.

## Can I Vote?

## You are eligible to register and vote if:

- You are an Oregon resident.
- You are a U.S. citizen or will be a U.S. citizen before Election Day.
- You are 18 years old by Election Day.
- New registrations must be completed and postmarked by April 24, 2012.

## You need to update your registration if:

- You move or change your mailing address.
- You change your name.
  - You wish to change your party affiliation.

## What if I've moved?

If you are <u>currently</u> registered to vote in Marion County but have moved within the county, you will need to update your registration by providing your current address(es) to the Elections Office in writing and requesting that a ballot be mailed.

## From Another Oregon County?

If you have been registered in another county in Oregon, but have moved to Marion County, you may still register and be eligible to vote a Marion County ballot.



#### Sublimity Fire District General Obligation Bond Authorization

**Question:** Shall the District be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not exceeding \$950,000? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

**Summary:** If approved, this measure authorizes the District to issue up to \$950,000 of general obligation bonds to finance capital costs, including the following:

- the acquisition of fire apparatus;
- equipment to outfit fire apparatus; and
- the payment of bond issuance costs.

The bonds may be issued in more than one series and each series will mature in fourteen (14) years or less from its issuance date. The, estimated average annual cost of the bonds would be an increase of approximately \$0.09 per \$1,000 of assessed value; after the District's currently outstanding general obligation bonds mature in 2018, the estimated average annual costs of the bonds would continue at approximately \$0.39 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The owner of a home with an assessed value of \$200,000 is estimated to pay an additional \$18 a year over current rates.

## Measure No. 24-327 Sublimity Fire District

## **Explanatory Statement:**

On May 15, 2012, the Sublimity Fire District is submitting a measure seeking authorization to issue general obligation bonds to purchase and outfit fire apparatus. The total amount will not exceed \$950,000. The district has estimated the amount to be raised each year will increase your taxes by approximately \$0.09 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

Currently residents are paying approximately \$0.30 per \$1,000 assessed valuation for a 20-year bond measure that was approved in 1998. This proposed bond measure will increase the <u>total</u> cost of the taxpayer <u>to</u> approximately \$0.39 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. When the 1998 bond measure matures/expires in 2018, the approximate \$0.39 per \$1,000 assessed valuation would continue until 2026 when the proposed bond measure would mature/ expire.

National standards recommend fire engines be replaced after 20 years of service. The fire district has three structural fire engines. Two are at the main station and one is at the Drift Creek substation. The engine to be replaced at the main station will be 20 years old in 2013 and the engine at the Drift Creek station is currently 30 years old. Due to the age of our apparatus the district has also seen an increasing trend in maintenance costs associated with keeping older fire apparatus functional.


This proposed bond measure will replace these two pieces of apparatus. It will also provide funding to purchase associated equipment for proper outfitting of the new apparatus. The new apparatus will be compliant with current national standards and are expected to be serviceable for 20 years.

#### Four Year Local Option Tax for Library, Pool, Parks Support

**Question:** Should, City of Stayton implement a \$.60 per thousand operating tax annually for four years, This Measure renews current taxes.

**Summary:**The City of Stayton is seeking a four-year local option tax of \$.60 per thousand, beginning in Fiscal Year 2013-2014, to continue funding of the library, swimming pool, and parks programs.

The proposed tax will offset the expiration of the existing four-year local option tax, passed in 2008, which ends with Fiscal Year 2012-2013.

Library support includes annual operating expenses, continuing current book and audiovisual budgets, annual support of the Storyteller outreach program.

Pool support includes maintaining established operating expenses and accomplishing several priority maintenance projects.

Parks will receive funding for projects and improvements recommended by the Parks Board.

A tax at rate of \$.60 per \$1,000 of assessed value would be an annual tax of \$84.00 for the average home owner in the City of Stayton with a home assessed at \$140,000. It is estimated this would generate \$1,322,000 over the four years; an allowance has been made for uncollected taxes. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of estimate.

## Measure No. 24-329 City of Stayton

## **Explanatory Statement:**

The City of Stayton is seeking a 4-year local option tax of \$.60 per thousand each year for continued operating support of the City's library and pool programs, beginning in Fiscal Year 2013-2014. Most of the tax would replace the loss of the existing local option tax that expires at the end of the next fiscal year (June 2013) and will continue the existing levels of operating support. Some of the proposed tax will be used for improvements that could not otherwise be afforded within the City's regular budget.

Over the 4-year life of the proposed levy, approximately 45% will go toward maintaining the current level of operating support for the Stayton Public Library, as well as the library's budget for books and audio-visual materials. Approximately 37.5% will go toward maintaining the current level of operating support for the Stayton Family Memorial Pool. The remainder of levy funds, aside from an allowance for uncollectible taxes, would go toward improvements at the Pool, Library and Parks.

The estimated cost of improvements and projects, is as follows:

ADA doors and modifications for Library building	\$ 5,000
Support for the Storyteller outreach program	\$ 10,000
Remodel of Pool locker rooms	\$ 46,500
Pool slide repair and relocate	\$ 33,400
Park projects and improvements	\$ 60,000

Many of the improvement projects would take place in the first year of the levy, with levy proceeds in the subsequent years used to repay up-front loans to accomplish the projects.

A tax at rate of \$.60 per \$1,000 of assessed value would be an annual tax of \$84.00 for the average home owner in the City of Stayton with a home assessed at \$140,000. It is estimated this would generate \$1,322,000 over the four years; an allowance has been made for uncollected taxes. The estimated tax for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of estimate.

Due to the property tax limitations imposed a decade ago by statewide Measures 47 and 50, the City cannot increase its established permanent tax rate, even if a majority of citizens wished to do so. Accordingly, the City must rely on periodically voted local option tax levies to augment its operating budget.

Stayton's first local option tax for the support of the library, pool, and parks was passed by voters in November 1998 (4-year). Subsequent local option tax measures were passed in May 2002 (3-year), May 2004 (4-year) and May 2008 (4-year).

## Measure No. 24-329 City of Stayton

## Argument in Favor:

Our City Council is seeking to continue an existing tax which expires next year. What they have neglected to tell us is that they have included a series of tax increases.

- The council has increased the rate to \$.60 per thousand. This will result in a 7% tax increase (approximate) from day one of the new tax being implemented.
- The expiring tax was fixed and collected \$300,000 per year. The new tax has built-in increases of 3% per year for each existing payer. This increase adds 3% from day one and compounds yearly.
- When the expiring tax was able to collect money from a new taxpayer, (like a house that was built two years ago) the money was used to lower the burden on existing payers. The new tax gives existing payers nothing but does charge new payers (like the \$20,000,000 hospital expansion) the full \$.60 per thousand that we pay. Once added, the new payer will also see yearly compounded 3% increases.

The total of all increases combined will equal a tax increase of approximately 14% in the first year. By the fourth year it will have jumped to approximately 30%. This will result in struggling homeowners having to pay even more taxes and landlords will be forced to raise the rent.

Our town has so much potential if we just had good councilors. This group has put us in a terrible position. They have given us an all-or-nothing proposition. If you vote no, the city will lose the \$300,000 it currently collects and pool hours will likely be reduced. If yes, the citizens are hit with a large tax increase. We deserve a third option where we could keep our taxes and services the same as we enjoy today.

UNLESS someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing's going to get better. No it's not.

## Measure No. 24-329 City of Stayton

### Argument in Favor:

Please Vote Yes on measure 24-329 to support the Stayton Public Library, Parks and Pool. A Yes vote will replace the local option tax that expires next year. A Yes vote will continue the pool programs and library services currently provided to the community and will provide upgrades to Stayton's Public Parks.

The levy provides approximately one third of the library's budget and a substantial portion of the pool's budget. Without the levy, the library would experience substantial reductions in hours and staff and the pool would face possible closure.

The present local option levy will end in June of 2013. It will be replaced by this new local option levy, which is for 60 cents a thousand. The owner of a house assessed at \$140,000 will pay \$84.00 per year, which is an increase of only 12 cents per more than the 2008 levy. A great bargain for services we all enjoy every day.

Specific promises were made to the voters at the 2008 election about what would be accomplished with the money collected. Those promises were kept. The projects and programs were funded and completed. The City of Stayton has shown it spent your tax dollars as directed by you.

## Measure No. 24-330 Marion County Fire District #1

## Four-Year Fire Operations Local Option Tax

**Question:** Shall District levy taxes of \$0.29 per \$1,000 of assessed value for four years beginning 2012-13 for fire service operations? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

**Summary:** In November 2006, voters approved a levy for \$0.16 per \$1,000 of assessed value to maintain fire and emergency service operations for Marion County Fire District No. 1. That levy expires June 2012.

The District is proposing a levy of \$0.29 per \$1,000 of assessed value. This levy would allow the District to limit the impact of proposed service reductions for the next four years.

A homeowner with an average assessed value of \$180,000 at the retiring rate of \$0.16/1,000 would have paid \$28.80. The proposed amount of \$0.29/1,000 would result in a homeowner paying \$52.20 per year in property taxes.

Marion County Fire District No. 1 is not a part of a city or county government; it is a "special service district," a governmental entity equal to a city or county for the purpose of providing fire and emergency services. The District is governed by an elected Board of Directors.

The levy would raise approximately \$714,463.37 in 2013-2014, \$728,752.64 in 2014-2015, \$743,327.69 in 2015-2016, and \$758,194.24 in 2016-2017. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of estimate.

## Measure No. 24-330 Marion County Fire District #1

## **Explanatory Statement:**

The elected Board of Directors for Marion County Fire District No. 1 ("District" as used herein) voted on 3/14/12 to place a funding measure on the May 15, 2012 ballot. In November 2006, voters approved a levy for \$0.16 per \$1,000 of assessed value to maintain fire and emergency service operations for Marion County Fire District No. 1. That levy expires in June 2012. Approval of this measure at \$.29 per \$1,000 of assessed property valuation equates to an increase of \$.13 per \$1,000 over the current and expiring Local Option Levy. This measure would fund District operations for the next four years.

In 1983 the District had 29 employees and 88 volunteers, running 1482 calls out of 7 stations. Today, the District has 40 employees and 81 volunteers, running over 5800 calls out of 8 stations.

Should the Option not pass, the District would determine what services would be reduced or eliminated. Approval of this local option levy would represent an additional \$.13 per thousand or \$23.40 per year for a \$180,000 home.

Marion County Fire District No. 1 is not part of the city or county but is a "special service district", a unit of government equal to a city or county. It is governed by an elected Board of Directors who are residents of the District. As elected representatives of the District residents, their responsibility is to represent the interests of the District residents by making policy decisions that ensure the highest level of fire and life safety services provided in the most cost effective manner.

The professional firefighters of Marion County Fire District #1 unanimously support measure 24-330. The Marion County Fire District's request for a four-year operating levy enables our firefighters to continue providing exceptional fire and emergency medical service to the residents of our district. This operating levy, 29 cents per \$1000 assessed value, is equal to a renewal plus 13 cents.

As we have provided exceptional service the costs associated to operations have increased, similar to those we all experience in our daily lives. In 2010 personnel agreed to wage and benefit reductions. Additionally, revenue has been eliminated due to the City of Salem's continued annexation of fire district property into the city.

In our effort to balance the budget the fire district has already laid off two office staff and a shop mechanic, the latter effectively closing our repair shop. MCFD#1 has received grants and federal funds to help offset our expenses but these do not subsidize all of the services we provide. Further cuts will become necessary without the revenue provided by this measure.

The operating levy would cost the owner of a \$170,000 home only \$49.30 per year (\$4 per month). A relatively small price for the security of knowing well trained firefighters and paramedics will be able to respond quickly and efficiently to emergency calls in your area.

Firefighters ask for your support of measure 24-330. We are your firefighters and your neighbors. This is about your level of service. Insure that we can protect your families, your homes and your businesses.






