A description of the steps the program has taken to decrease the use of restraint and involuntary seclusion.	youth is in danger of harming themselves or someone else per BRS regulations.  GAP staff will use the least amount of force necessary to restrain youth. GAP staff will use the methods taught through CPI and NCI training. Only GAP staff who have been trained in CPI/NCI are allowed to use any kind of restraints.  GAP staff will use the same DBT skills we teach to the youth to help them problem solve, to think more clearly and to handle their emotions when they arise before resorting to any restraint of the youth. When youth are in their emotional minds, we use a Collaborative Problem Solving tracking sheet to help youth see how their behaviors are impacting how they are doing in GAP. It is a staff and youth effort to help youth see what skills they could have used instead of acting out or being restrained in any way.
