Ask Mister Sustainability

uestion: My company is a leader in sustainable business practices. We are practically zerowaste, have cut our carbon footprint dramatically, and have expanded our sustainable practices into the social and economic part of the process. What's next?

Wow, that's not a question I get everyday—good for you! Without more information, I'll make some assumptions; your business views waste as inefficiency, incorporates reused and recycled goods in your supply chain, measures and reduces energy use, and your staff takes an active role in your green initiatives. Does that sound about right?

If that's the case—or only most of the case—then I suggest that communication is the next big thing on the agenda. Factoid Department

Just how much stuff does Marion County recover (recycle)? The numbers are just in...looks like we are credited with diverting 58% of what gets tossed.

That's good enough for second best in the state.

Numero uno? That would be Metro. They topped out at **60.4%**.

We still ended up with over **243,000 tons** of garbage...roughly **9%** of the statewide total of **2.7 million tons**.

Is zero waste possible? Maybe. The Ford Motor Company claims that their Dearborn River Rouge Center facilities (six of them) have finally attained it, preventing **14 million tons** of landfill waste.

France wants to get disposable plastic bags out of their waste stream. Their use was outlawed this summer.

Now they say that disposable plastic plates, cups, and cutlery will be banned after 2020. Exceptions? Only for those disposables that are compostable.

Currently, **Six U.S. states** have some type of ban or restriction on disposable plastic bags.
